5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

- ❖ The institution publishes its updated prospectus and academic calendar annually. Thus information is communicated to the students at the beginning of every academic year.
- ❖ Union Office bearers disseminate information to the freshers about the availability of phone facility, xerox facility, stores for procurement of stationery and canteen facilities for refreshment.
- ❖ Orientation programme is conducted for the freshers. The Principal, Self Finance Director, Administrative Officer, Dean, Controller, Heads of multiple disciplines, various Cell Heads and Physical Director guide the first year students. Dean explains about salient features CBCS and the students are guided to select Non Major Elective and major electives. The benefits of Add-on course, certificate/Diploma course and self development course are highlighted. The Controller of Examination explains about continuous assessment, summative examination and about the payment of fees and the declaration of results. The Heads of the department explain course structure & question pattern. The various Cell Coordinators explain the benefits of joining NSS, YRC, RRC, Entry in service, Talking club, Readers club, Women cell, Gandhian Thought, Consumer Club, Entrepreneur club, Self development courses, World University Service, Alumni Association and the benefits of availing Grievance redressal, Career guidance & Placement cell were highlighted. The Physical Director stresses the need for physical exercise and explains sports facilities available in the campus, Yoga and Karate practices provided in the institution and availability of free medical facilities.
- ❖ Students service organisation is functioning effectively with students service officers drawn from various faculty representing the different departments. S.S.O is headed by two senior faculty and 21 staff members and students union office bearers. They play an active role in enhancing students involvement in college activities and facilitate the participation of students in intercollegiate meet, youth festival organised by MKU and motivate the students to win prizes and medals. They conduct orientation program for the freshers and organise awareness

program on road safety, human rights and cultural program for the students. Placement cell conducts training programmes for the students and arranges job fair in collaboration with employers. 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- ❖ The institution has academic freedom and the curriculum is designed in alignment with the institution mission. It focuses on multi skill development of students in order to ensure employability. The curriculum under CBCS enables the students to select their own choice of Major electives, Non-major electives and Skill based electives.
- ❖ Choice Based Credit System followed in the institution facilitates horizontal mobility. Certificate and diploma courses that are offered by various disciplines enable the students to have horizontal mobility and also to acquire skills in other discipline.
- ❖ The curriculum is revised once in three years and also whenever there is a need. Design and Revision of curriculum is done based on the demand of recent development as well as feedback from stakeholders. The feedback highlights the relevance and appropriateness of curricula in catering to the needs of the society, economy and environment.
- ❖ The college follows the guidelines for curriculum development and restructuring set down by the Madurai Kamaraj University, TANSICHE and UGC. The Board of studies, the Academic Council and the Governing Body of the Institution are constituted according to the norms laid down by the UGC.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- ❖ The teachers are motivated to introduce an interactive and participatory approach, creating a feeling of responsibility in learning and makes learning a process of construction of knowledge.
- ❖ Professional competencies of teachers are enhanced through periodical training in teaching technique. Induction training, spoken language and computer training classes are arranged for the newly recruited faculty.
- ❖ **Remedial classes** for the under privileged section of the students society are conducted regularly.
- ❖ **Entry Level Test** is conducted for the first year students to know their level of learning and **Bridge Course** classes are arranged according to their level of

performance.

- ❖ ICT enabled teaching make the learning students centred and extracting the contribution of students.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- ❖ Semester system with continuous Internal Assessment is followed for UG, PG and M.Phil Degree courses. Three Internal Assessments test are conducted for the benefit of students. Annual examination system is followed for Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma Courses.
- ❖ The evaluation process consists of continuous Assessment and summative examination.
- ❖ Results will be published within 10 days after the completion of all examinations. Results will be published in the college campus and also will be posted in the website. Results will be declared only after the pursual of students performance by the Heads of the Department and the approval of Awards committee is mandatory for the publication of examination results.
- ❖ Students are allowed to apply for Revaluation / Retotalling / Xerox copy within 10 days after the publication of results.
- ❖ Students are permitted to appear for the supplementary examinations in the same semester for the failed subjects.
- ❖ Supplementary Examinations are conducted within 15days after the publication of Summative Examination result in every year January and June respectively.
- ❖ Students should have a minimum of 75% of attendance in a semester for appearing in the examination. The students who do not have the minimum attendance, below 50% will not be allowed to write examinations, they are asked to repeat their period of study again in that particular semester.

Karate can be used as a weapon of self defence in which tremendous physical power is exerted. It develops the self confidence of students and can be used as an excellent form of stress release. - ❖ Majority of students are from rural background and have done their schooling in the medium of regional language. It is a challenge for the college to develop communicative skill in English which is required for job market
- ❖ Retention of efficient Staff in the self finance stream
- ❖ Students from lower strata are unable to afford money to pursue courses apart from the regular stream

1.3.1 Feedback from Alumni

Feedback was collected from the UG alumni. They were asked to rate by applying four parameters such as Curriculum, Teaching Abilities, Evaluation and Infrastructure. Eighty One (81%) percentage of the alumni felt that the curriculum facilitated higher studies and gave them moral and spiritual values to life. seventy three (73%) percentage of the alumni opined that the abilities of the teachers , coverage of the syllabus and relationship with students were very good. Seventy (70%) percentage alumni felt that the evaluation system followed in the college was good. Seventy one(71%)percentage of the alumni stated that they enjoyed the infrastructure and atmosphere of the college.

The PG Alumni students were asked to rate by applying four parameters such as curriculum , teaching abilities, evaluation and infrastructure. Seventy eight (78%) percentage of the alumnus felt that the content of the curriculum was good certificate and diploma courses facilitated them to higher studies. Eighty three (83%) percentage of the alumni opined that the coverage of the syllabus and preparatory work done by teachers were very good . Eighty nine(89%) percentage of the alumni gave the opinion about the evaluation of internal assessment test and assignment system were the best. seventy two(72%) percentage alumni felt that the infrastructure facilities such as library reference , canteen and stores available were good.

1.3.2 Feedback Report from Parents

The parents were asked to state their opinion for 16 statements by selecting the options under three heads namely “good” “satisfactory” and “Requires improvement”. The parents were given options to select any one of the three options for these sixteen statements.

5. Drinking water – outlets should be increased.

1.3.3 Feedback Report on Curriculum

Feedback on Curriculum was collected from all the final year students. The students were asked to rate the course on seven parameters using four points scaling technique. The parameters include the following:

- ❖ Depth of the course content including project work if any.
- ❖ Extent of Coverage of Course
- ❖ Applicability /relevance to real life situations.
- ❖ Learning value (in terms of knowledge, concepts, manual skills, analytical abilities and broadening perspectives)
- ❖ Clarity &relevance of textual reading material
- ❖ Relevance of additional Source material (library)
- ❖ Extent of effort required by students

Analysis:

The students were asked to rate the curriculum of their department by awarding marks for the seven parameters given above. 4 marks were to be given for 'very good' option, 3 marks were to be given for 'good' option, 2 marks for 'satisfactory' option and 1 mark for 'unsatisfactory' option. The total score given by each student was calculated for all the seven parameters. On the basis of the total score the analysis was made as 'very good' and 'good', 'satisfactory' and 'unsatisfactory'. If the total score given by the student was greater than 21, then the result was consider as very good. If the total score was 15 to 21, then the result was good, if the total score was 8 to 14 then the result was satisfactory. If the total score was 7 then the result is unsatisfactory. Final analysis was made by categorising the total number of students on the basis of scores given by them as very good, good, satisfactory and unsatisfactory. The total number of students was calculated for each option and it was expressed in terms of percentages.

Findings:

1. History- (TM) 86% of the students very much satisfied with the curriculum. They selected very good and good options. History (EM)- 83% of the students selected very good and good option and were satisfied with the curriculum.90% of the PG students selected very good and good option and they were very much satisfied with the curriculum.

2. English -94% of the Regular students selected very good options. B.A., English (Sf) A- 95% selected Very good option, B.A English SF (B)-97 % Students selected very good options. This analysis shows that students were very much satisfied with

the Curriculum, 92% of the PG students selected very good and good option and they were very much satisfied with the curriculum.

3. Zoology-98% of the students selected very good and good option. They are very much satisfied.

4. B.Com (R) -97% of the students selected good and very good option. 86% of the B.Com (SF) students selected good and very good option, 92% of the B.Com (CA) students selected good and very good option 100% .M.Com (CA) select good and very good options.

5. Maths (R)-94% of the students selected very good and good option. Maths (SF)-88% of the students selected very good and good option. M.Sc Maths – 80% of students selected very good and good option.

6. BBA-85 % of the students selected very good and good option. They are very much satisfied.

7. Computer Science- 96% of the students selected very good and good option.

8. Information Technology (A)- 84% of the students selected very good and good option. Information Technology (B)- 76% of the students selected very good and good option. M.Sc.Information Technology- 83% of the students selected very good and good option. They are very much satisfied with the curriculum.

9. Tamil- 96% of the students selected very good and good option. They are very much contented with the curriculum. 80 % of the PG students selected very good and good option and they were very much satisfied with the curriculum.

10. Physics – 78% of the students selected very good and good option. Students are much satisfied with the syllabus. M.Sc Physics- 92% of the students selected very good and good option.

11. Nutrition and Dietetics - 61% of the students selected very good and good option. Students are very much satisfied with the curriculum.

12. BCA- 96% of the students selected very good and good option. MCA- 100% of students chosen very good and good options. They are very much contented with the course.

13.Chemistry – 70% of the students selected very good and good option.

Suggestions:

1. Use of educational technology like power point presentation by students, web based assignment should be extensively practiced.
2. Multimedia communication can be developed for improving the standard of spoken English.
3. Slow learners must be given extra care and repeated tests.
4. Students should be guided to refer e-books, e-journals and other net sources.
5. Minor project preparation should be insisted for the all the students.
6. Role play and Brainstorming sessions to enhance the innovative skill among the students
7. E-Content development should be emphasized for each unit of subjects in Curriculum
8. Efforts should be taken to enrich the level of satisfaction for all the subjects above 90% for good and very good options.
9. Group Discussion among students, paper presentation and seminars will enrich the knowledge of students.
10. Guest lectures must be increased to equip the students with the current trends.

Follow up:

1. 47042 Volume of books and 102 journals are made available for the reference of students.
2. EDUSAT and Vyas Educational consortium prepared E-content materials for various subjects. The faculties were asked to refer these sources and download the materials.
3. The analysis of feedback of student helped the faculty to find out the methods of applicability of the subjects to current situation. Industrial visit, Internship training, project work and practical classes are extensively adopted to bridge the gap between theory and practical.
4. Guest Lectures, Conference and Seminars were organized for the students in the following topics:

1.3.4 Feedback from the students on the general performance

2.1 During the academic year (2016 – 2017) a feedback was obtained from the students to identify the areas of inadequacies and the responses were analyzed. Follow-up actions were taken to rectify the inadequacies. A feedback was obtained during the current academic year to know our strength and weakness. An elaborate Questionnaire using 5 points scaling technique using “Very good, Good, Fair, Poor & No response” was administrated.

The questionnaire was given to 10% of the final year students belonging to various disciplines at random. Proportionate random sampling method was used in the collection of data. Collected data were tabulated.

2.2 Analysis /Findings:

On the basic of the analysis the major findings are given below.

Teaching methods:

The Students are satisfied with Lectures (95%), Seminars (92%), Workshops (63%), Guest Lectures (91%), Interactions (67%), Teaching aids used in the class (71%), Home Assignments (72%), Project work (82%), Group Discussion (81%) and Field Trips (80%). The feedback shows that the students were in need of more number of workshops as only 63% of the students are satisfied with Workshops. This observation has been referred to Teaching Aids and Methods Committee. -

Curriculum:

The students are satisfied with the Existing Syllabus (77%), Existing Certificate Courses (84%), Existing Diploma Courses (86%), Self Employment Courses (80%), Games Oriented Courses-Yoga, Karate etc. (85%), Computer Courses (84%) and Gandhian Thought (83%). Only 77% of the students are satisfied with Existing Syllabus. This observation has been referred to curriculum committee.

Academic Environment:

The students are satisfied with guidance from Campus Environment (79%), Classroom Environment (81%), Use of library (83%), Use of Idle Hours (86%), Teaching staff (85%) and 82% of the students expressed that the study hour in the hostel is adequate. Only 79% of the students are satisfied with Campus Environment. This observation has been referred to Teaching Aids and Methods committee

Students Service:

Students are satisfied with Medical Service (79%), Remedial Classes (79%), Placement Services (76%), Parent Teacher Meeting (82%), Tutor-Ward System (79%), Alumni Association (82%) and Grievance Redressal (82%). Only 76% of the students are satisfied with Placement Services. This observation has been referred to Students Welfare and Service Committee.

Infrastructure facilities:

The students are satisfied existing Buildings (83%), Students Store (79%), Bus Facilities (84%), Bank Service (85%), Canteen Service (76%), Computer/Xerox facilities /Browsing Facilities (76%), Sports Facilities (84%), Language Lab (75%), Computer Lab Facilities (82%), Hostel Facilities (72%), Games Court (79%), Furniture Facilities (92%), Toilet Facilities (71%), Drinking Water Facilities (73%), Cleanliness (84%), Garden (84%) and Security Services (91%). Only 71% Students are satisfied with Toilet Facilities. This observation has been referred to Infrastructure Committee.

Issues Related to Finance:

The students are satisfied with Scholarship Facilities (89%), Students Aid Fund (89%), Aid from the Management (86%), UGC Method Scheme (87%), Bank

Loans (75%). Only 75% of the students are satisfied with Bank Loans. This observation has been referred to Organization and Management Committee.

Employment Generation:

The students are satisfied with Self Development Courses (92%), Coaching for Competitive Exams (77%), Campus Drive (68%) and Employment Guidance from the staff (83%). Only 68% of the students are satisfied with the Campus Drive. This observation has been referred to Career Guidance and Placement Cell.

Organization and Management:

The students are satisfied with Office Services (89%), Fees (84%), Management Involvement (87%), Teachers Involvement (88%), Time Schedule Allotment (86%), Class Room Allotment (84%), Bus Arrangement during function days (91%), Method of conducting Internals Tests (90%) and Response of Staff in Solving Students Problems (86%). Only 84% of the students are satisfied with Class Room Allotment. This observation has been referred to Organization and Management Committee.

Recommendations:

Teaching Aids and Methods Committee:

The observations of the students on the arrangement of Workshops are very much considered. The Heads of the Departments are advised to arrange Workshops.

Regarding Campus Environment, The Students observation on the new facilities offered during the current year as a sequel to previous feedback analysis appear to be encouraging. The positive response is due to the current Campus Environment.

Curriculum Committee:

Since Students expect improvements in the Existing Syllabus, the Committee has desired to include current trends in the Syllabus during the ensuing semester.

Students Service and Welfare Committee:

The committee has recommended to take Special Care for the Placement Services in the campus.

Infrastructure Committee:

The Committee feels that there is a need to provide additional Toilet facilities .

Career Guidance cell:

The student's favourable response is due to Campus drive on career guidance and also the cell suggests to involve more number of Campus drive to the students.

Issues Related to Finance:

The Committee suggests that efforts to be taken for getting more Bank Loans for the benefit of the Students.

Organization and Management Committee:

The committee recommends for the Construction of more number of Classrooms.

Follow-up:

1. The Head of the Departments are advised to arrange Workshops.
2. The students store is established to meet the needs of the students.
3. The Number of Buses are increased for the long distance .
4. Grievance redressal cell is activated-the grievances are properly recorded.
5. "Green Revolution" a project for improving the garden is going on in our college campus with active participation of the students.
6. Computer and Xerox facilities are extended by increasing the number of computer systems and Xerox machines.
7. Career guidance cell is further strengthened to provide information through job guideline journals. Orientation programmes and seminars are organized to

create awareness about the various attributes of competitive examinations, employment and higher education.

2.12 Feedback Report on the performance of the Faculty

Feedback Report from the students on the performance of the faculty

To appraise the performance of the teachers a feedback arrangement was made. A questionnaire using three point scale (Very good, Good, Fair) was structured focusing on subject knowledge, communicative skills, use of teaching aids, punctuality, functional transparency and motivating/inspiring students. The questionnaire was given to 10 final year students of each major. The random sampling method was used. The students were asked to assess all the faculty members of their department. There are 154 faculty members and each member was assessed by 148 students. The data collected was tabulated and analyzed.

Findings

- 1. Subject Knowledge:** 100 % of the final year students gave the result that all our faculty members subject knowledge were good.
- 2. Communication Skill:** 98% of the students reported that the Communications Skill among our teaching faculties were good
- 3. Methods – Tools used:** 97% of the students gave good result regarding the use of OHP, PowerPoint, Smart Classroom, Smart Board facilities by our faculty members.
- 4. Coverage of Syllabus:** 96% of our students feel that the coverage of syllabus by our faculties was good.
- 5. Punctuality:** 95% of the students stated that Punctuality maintained by our faculty members was good in attending the class in time.
- 6. Functional Transparency** 99% of the final year students reported that the transparency maintained by the staff members was good .
- 7. Motivation, Inspiring of Students:** 96% of the students gave the result that the teachers were good in Motivating the students towards their Higher studies.

Follow-up:

Staff members were given opportunities to undergo faculty development programme to enrich their communication skills to adopt latest teaching methods and to reform their teaching plans so as to motivate and inspire students.

7.3 Best Practices

Best Practice I – GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The **General Assembly** is conducted on **every Friday** for one hour in the morning. It is arranged for the students, in order to communicate information and share learning experiences.

Objectives of the practice

- Creating oneness among the students through Inter religious prayer
- Inculcating values and virtues in the mind of students
- Familiarising with day to day events
- Enhancing General Knowledge
- Creating a bond among the students, and between the staff and students and vice-versa
- Kindling the creativity in the students and bringing out the originality and hidden talents.
- Developing the leadership quality

The context

An assembly is where the students meet together to share aspects of life that are of worth. It acts as medium for communicating matters of significance from one generation to another. Assembly acts as a one of the main ways by which we create our positive reflective ethos and promote our value-based education. All faculties and students make a tremendous contribution through their presence and active participation. Students are aware that all staff by their positive attitude involve themselves in assemblies, acting as role models for the students to emulate. Assembly contains times of quiet reflection that enables students to develop the deepest values and aspirations of the human spirit. The students enable to learn the values, life skills and understand the structured environment. Assembly can serve to develop a positive college ethos that confirms the college identity and aspirations. The result being that

the college lives in cohesive harmony that sustains the pursuit of excellence in all its forms.

The Practice

Each department is offered a chance to conduct the **General Assembly** during every week.

"GOD IS EVERYWHERE SO PRAY ANYWHERE"

(i) Singing the prayer song

The college has an excellent choir to sing prayer songs and other patriotic songs with utmost devotion.

"IF YOU KNEEL BEFORE GOD YOU CAN STAND BEFORE ANY MAN"

(ii) Reading verses from the three holy books

Verses from the GITA, QURAN and BIBLE are read in the assembly with their equivalent meanings in English. Thus students get a chance to know all the verses present in the three holy books. This practise helps in creating oneness among the students.

Students participate enthusiastically in inter-religious prayer. Muslim students read the Bible, Christian and Hindu students read the Bagavath Gita which proves the communal ambience.

(iii) Presenting thought for the day

Moral values are not merely read, they are inculcated within the students. So far not a single thought has been repeated. Students are so involved in presenting as well as following the moral values.

(iv) Reading regional language and English-language News

The important happenings of the whole week is presented in the assembly in the following order

National news, International news, Regional news, Sports news

(v) Giving short talks or stories

Narration of stories for 3 minutes gives valuable messages to the students.

(vi) Giving questions and answers related to general knowledge

The most important of all is the GK session. Students enthusiastically participate in it. Questions are taken in an effective way so that students who prepare for their civil services and other competitive exams infer from it.

Special features

- Each department is given opportunity to conduct assembly to develop their skills.
- Communications regarding COE office such as details of exam fees, dates of summative examinations, details of scholarship and holidays are announced.
- During the assembly the Principal appreciates the students who win prizes in sports, academic competitions and cultural events conducted within and outside the college. This encourages them to a large extent.
- At the end of the academic year the proceedings of the assembly such as **thought for the day, inter-religious thought, short-talks** or **story** and **general knowledge** are compiled and published as news letter titled **“Campus Tweet”**.

It motivates the students and creates a competitive spirit among them.

Evidence of success

Prayer is a communication between God and man. In respect of prayer the status of success cannot be determined in the explicit way as it is an introvert aspect. The way in which the students participate in the prayer is a only way to justify the level of success.

- One of our Muslim student **selvi.M.Powsiya Banu II B.A (Tamil)** got first **prize in Bagavath Gita** essay competition organized by Sri Krishna Balaram Temple, Madurai, which is the testimony for the inter religious prayer.
- Healthy competitive spirit in crossing benchmarks among students is created. Students are free to share their views regarding the conduct of Friday assembly. Every student has wonderful experience and shares her views about the assembly with our Principal directly.
- It enhances public speaking skill
- It builds team spirit among the students

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

During rainy season, it is difficult for the students to come from different buildings to attend the general assembly in the ground.

Best Practice II - YOGA & KARATE

Yoga and is a vast collection of spiritual techniques and practices aimed at integrating mind, body and spirit to achieve a state of enlightenment or oneness with the universe. To make physically and mentally stronger, the hostel students practice yogasanas in the morning and evening at our campus. Yoga helps to equip oneself with basic knowledge about one's personality and to handle life situations. It enables them to learn techniques related to good health. It develops a discriminative mind capable of knowing the real from the unreal and helps to face the dualities of life with equanimity. It inculcates great values in the minds of the students.

Karate co-ordinates mind and body. Karate can be used as a weapon of self defence in which tremendous physical power is exerted. It develops the self confidence of students and can be used as an excellent form of stress release. Students are trained in 20 kattas like Heian Shodan, Heian Nidan, Heian Sandan, Heian Yandan, Heian gondan, Bassai Dai, Bassai sho, Karku Dai and Karku sho

Objectives of the practice

- To improve the concentration power
- Synchronization of mind and body
- To improve the emotional intelligence

The Context

“A sound mind is a sound body” says an old adage. The mind and the body should be taken care of, as they act on each other. Physical health is essential to happiness. If the body is strong and healthy, mind will also be healthy. Students will be cheerful and will be able to work with confidence. Therefore, the body and the mind are interdependent and complimentary with each other. Stress removal is one of the salient feature of yoga. If mind is free from worries and concentration is made upon one single entity, naturally the level of stress will be reduced and they will be removed gradually. Yoga helps in self-discipline and self-control, leading to immense amount of awareness, concentration and higher level of consciousness.

The present day situation warrants yoga programme in the academic field and also in the society. The college conducts yoga classes to the hostel students by a trained yoga master. Classes on yoga is offered to the students at free of cost.

The Practice

Yoga is practiced by our college hostel students regularly. First and Second year students perform yoga from **7 am to 8 am** and from **4.30 pm to 5.30 pm** respectively. Students are selected to take, in- depth training on advanced yoga to perform in the sports day. Students practice various yogasanas such as Ustrasana, Suriya Namaskaram, Padmasana, Padahasthasana, Purpauttanasan, Dhanurasana, Bhujangasana, Shalabhasana, Halasana and Gomukhasana and so on. Hence it helps to increase the efficient functioning of kidney, to balance the panic and mental forces and very useful to reduce weight.

Evidence of success

Every year Students perform yoga on the occasion of the **Independence Day** and **Republic Day** celebrations in the A.R ground. Our students are presented with “**Best Yoga Performer Award**” and received overall shield from the **District Collector**. It is evident that some of the best **trained yoga students** serve as **yoga**

masters in schools and educational institutions. For the Past ten years our college has been conducting Yoga classes for hostel students.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- During rainy seasons, it is difficult for the students to come from the hostel to attend the Yoga classes in the ground.
- Some students experience initial difficulty in performing yoga.
