PREFACE

E.M.Gopalakrishna Kone Yadava Women’s College, Madurai was founded in the year **1974** by late Thiru.E.M.G. Soundararajan as President, being inspired by the philanthropic ideals of Thiru.E.M.Gopalakrishna Kone to provide education for the **economically and socially backward women** and also to uplift them to a state of dignity through economic prosperity and societal recognition. The motto of the college is ‘Anbum, Arivum, Panbum Yadhavam; Magalir Arivu, Kudumba Uyarvu’- which means **“By educating a woman we educate the whole family”**.

The college was started only with **Pre-University Course** at E.M.G.Kalyana Mandabam at Tallakulam, Madurai, in 1974. Later the college was shifted to the present campus at New Natham Road, Thiruppalai, in a sprawling **15 acres** of land donated by **E.M.G. Charitable Trust** in the year **1980**.

At present the college offers **14 UG Courses**: History(both English & Tamil Medium), English Literature, Zoology, Commerce, Commerce with CA, Mathematics, Business Administration, Computer Science, Information Technology, Tamil Literature, Physics, Nutrition & Dietetics, BCA and Chemistry. It also offers **8 PG Courses**: M.Sc (Mathematics), M.Sc (Information Technology), M.Sc (Physics), M.Com with CA, M.A (English), M.A (History), M.A (Tamil) including AICTE approved MCA degree course and **2 Research courses** namely M.Phil (Mathematics) and M.Phil (Commerce), PGDCA, **12 Certificate Courses** which include CGT & DGT, **5 Diploma courses** and **2 Advanced Diploma courses**. The college has all the required infrastructure facilities for the above courses.

The college has a Computerized Central Library with Bar Coding System, Open Air Theatre, Seminar hall, Conference Hall, Digital Language Lab, Computer Labs, Basic Science Labs and Hostels with spacious dining hall. The Computer Lab is well-equipped with internet facility. The students are provided with all the basic amenities like Canteen, Store, Photocopier,

Audio-Visual facilities, Banking Service, Health Club, Day Care Centre and Purified drinking water facility.

The dedicated staff members of our college are striving hard to shape the budding flowers, our students, to bloom with quality education, motivation and self confidence. Consequently the **NAAC** Peer team visited our college in **2003** and accredited the institution with **B++ Grade**.

Adding another feather to the cap, our college attained **Autonomous** status in the **year 2006**. Autonomy has given academic freedom like Curriculum designing with CBCS, planning and implementation, which would certainly lead to the maintenance of high academic standards. On the recommendation of the **Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSICHE)**, we have introduced the revised structure of curriculum based on Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in the year 2008.

The **NAAC** peer team visited our college in February **2010** and Re-accredited the institution with **‘A’ Grade** with CGPA 3.17. After the fruitful deployment of the autonomous status during 2006-2013, an **extension of six year tenure of Autonomy** was granted by the University Grants Commission from **2013 to 2019**.

Founded in the year 1974 with only Pre-University course, our institution gradually flourished as a first grade college, offering UG, PG, M.Phil & Professional Course. This tremendous growth was made possible only due to the magnanimous “E.M.Gopalakrishna Kone Trust”, formed with the vision of uplifting the rural womenfolk. To fulfill the vision of our patron, Thiru.E.M.Gopalakrishna Kone , his son, Thiru.E.M.G.Soundararajan, donated 15 acres of land for the noble cause of educating , enlightening and empowering underprivileged women from rural areas. Having started with **9** faculty members, **5** non-teaching staff and **80** students at E.M.G.Kalyana Mandabam, Tallakulam, Madurai, our institution, today witnesses a remarkable development with **165** devoted and committed **faculty** and **60 non-teaching staff**, involved in the caliber building of **4190** women students.

Any academic move in our institution under the leadership of our President and Secretary, Tmt.E.M.G.S.Indirani, is always a quality initiative and our management, faculty and students strain their every nerve to sustain it. The long term academic sustenance leads to enhancement of quality in all the attempted spheres. **Women empowerment** being the **mission** of the institution, our curriculum jurisdiction encompasses a number of components which enhance the competency level of our **rural** and **first generation** college – goers who constitute the **larger chunk** of our **student community**. SECTION - II

CRITERION-I

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- ❖ Nine years of Academic autonomy of freedom enables the institution to restructure its curriculum. The developments and implementations made in the curriculum facilitate the students to reach their goals. The curriculum is adaptable, skill oriented and job oriented.
- ❖ The curriculum has been framed according to the vision and mission of the college. In 2006, at the time of the introduction of Autonomy, the curriculum underwent a revision from **University Curriculum** to our own design of **Choice Based Credit System**. In 2008, as per the directions from the **Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education**, the curriculum has been restructured and **Revised Choice Based Credit System** is followed.
- ❖ The curriculum is divided into five parts- **Part I, Part II, Part III, Part IV and Part V**. **Part I** offers Languages Tamil, French, Hindi and Sanskrit, **Part II** is devoted to learning of English. **Part III** comprises of Core subjects, Elective subjects and Allied subjects. **Part IV** includes Non-Major Electives, Skill based subjects, Environmental Studies and Value Education. NSS and Physical Education are offered under **Part V**.
- ❖ Core subjects build in-depth knowledge and NME develops inter disciplinary knowledge. Job oriented competence is acquired through Skill Based Courses and Electives are offered to fulfill the students' interest in various subjects.
- ❖ More new UG, PG, M.Phil programmes were introduced in par with the present scenario.
- ❖ All the departments offer **Certificate** and **Diploma** courses that provides inter disciplinary approach and enhance the competency of students.

- ❖ Feedback on curriculum is obtained from the students for the revision of curriculum.
- ❖ The academic programmes are efficiently monitored and implemented by the Dean of academic affairs. The Controller of Examinations governs the major role in the students' academic progression.

CRITERION-II

TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- ❖ According to the guidelines of **Tamil Nadu Government**, the college follows systematic process for Admission of students for various programmes.
- ❖ The students are admitted in UG and PG programmes based on their marks obtained in the Examination as per the norms of the Tamil Nadu Government.
- ❖ The Reservation policy notified by the Government, 18+1=**19 %** for SC/ST, **20%** for OBC, **30%** for the other backward classes and **31 %** for the general category, is mandatory for the admission of the candidates.
- ❖ **Orientation programme** is conducted for both the freshers and the parents every year to acquaint them with the functioning routines and the ambience of the college.
- ❖ As humongous students hail from rural areas and from Tamil Medium, **Bridge Courses** are conducted by all Disciplines to hone their learning skills.
- ❖ To make the Learning process more effective, **Field Trip, Group Discussions, Digital Language Lab activities, Seminars, Workshops, Power Point presentation and Peer Team Teaching** are also offered by all the departments.
- ❖ To make the teaching and learning process more effective, Internet connections through Wi-Fi modem, LCD projectors and Laptops are also provided to all the departments.
- ❖ The Faculty of the college participates and present papers at the **State, National and International Seminar/ Conferences/Workshops** to enhance and develop their teaching abilities and to update themselves.
- ❖ The library being student-friendly, the students make optimum use of it, in the absence of the teacher under the guidance of the Library staff.

- ❖ On the basis of the Government Norms, meritorious staff are appointed, giving equal preference to everyone.
- ❖ **Faculty Development Programme (FDP)** on different themes and orientation programme by the IQAC are organized periodically to facilitate the newly appointed staff.
- ❖ It is mandatory for the students to attend classes each semester in order to acquire the **required attendance** as stipulated in the calendar.
- ❖ All the departments are involved in preparing **Question Banks** for all prescribed papers in every semester and the hand outs are circulated to the students for better preparation and to secure good marks in the Summative Examination.
- ❖ The College periodically carries out examination and evaluation reforms.

CRITERION-III

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- ❖ **RESEARCH:** In the last five years the college has been striving hard to provide conducive atmosphere to merge teaching and research. Many staff members are intensely involved in research activities. Since teaching, research and extension are the three major dimensions of higher education, the college promotes a research culture among faculty and students through consultancy and collaboration.
- ❖ Number of Ph.D holders has ascended from **5** to **23** during the Post accreditation period 2010-2015
- ❖ At present five Minor Research Projects have been completed and there are two minor ongoing projects. Faculty members have brought out many articles in International, National, and Conference Proceedings when compared with the previous cycle.
- ❖ Availability of Books, Journals and Magazines and INFLIBNET facility are strengths for staffs and students to carry out their research successfully
- ❖ Further to promote research culture on campus, the R & D cell is periodically organizing research awareness programmes.

- ❖ The availability of books and journals and INFLIBNET facility in the library for e-resources access are great boon for students and staff pursuing research. Staff members are deputed to take up Faculty Development Programmes. Seminars, Workshops and Symposia organised and attended by the teachers here and elsewhere. Faculty Development Programmes, publication of research papers in the reputed journals, Refresher courses and Orientation Programmes enhance the teaching ability of the staff members along with research.
- ❖ Special consideration is given in the time table for the faculty members who are involved in part time research. Leave without pay are given to the Self Financed faculty members for completion of research.
- ❖ CONSULTANCY: The faculty members of the college are invited by other institutions, as resource persons based on their experience and expertise without monetary gain. All the departments of our college offer consultancy services to various institutions.
- ❖ Department of Zoology provides consultancy service on Mushroom cultivation, Vermi compost and they generate income by making sales to the outsiders and also generate income by conducting Blood Group Analysis to students and to the public.
- ❖ Weekly General Assembly is conducted for staff and students to sensitize social issues. Information related to students support measures, inter and intra college competitions, campus cleaning, ban on plastic bags, ban on using cell phones inside the college campus, dress code are informed regularly during the assembly which is conducted on every Friday.
- ❖ Regularly, Spiritual Classes are arranged by Ramakrishna Math and ISKAN Temple to promote spiritual values among the students.
- ❖ Consultancy on Yoga and Stress management are offered by the trained students in the adopted villages.

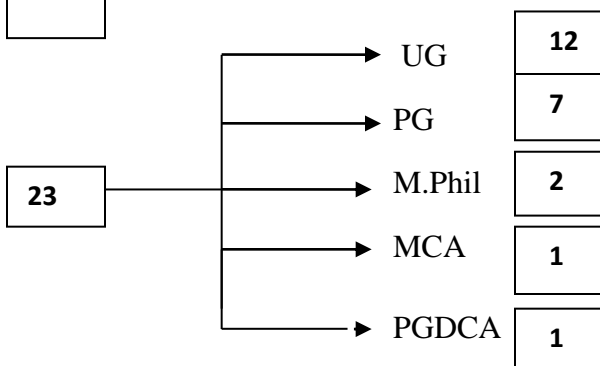

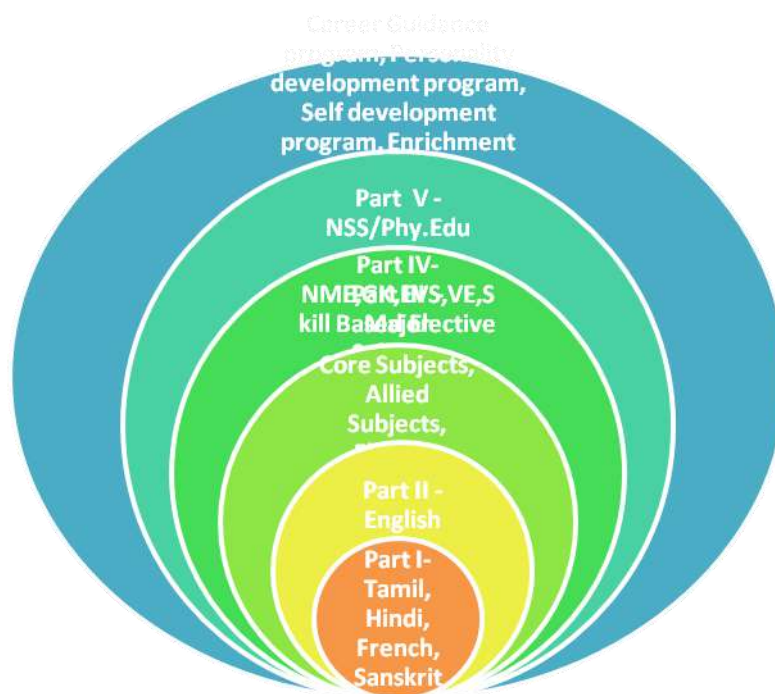

- Provision of value added education to do right things at right time to make them useful and responsible citizens tomorrow. For the present scenario spiritual knowledge is essential to make woman, a complete woman. So we believe in giving value added education.
- Students Service Organization enriches leadership quality.

Reflection of Vision/Mission in the academic programme

The curriculum has been framed according to the vision and mission of the college. In the year 2006, at the time of the introduction of Autonomy, the curriculum underwent a revision from University curriculum to our own design of Choice Based Credit System. In the year 2008, as per the directions from the TamilNadu State Council for higher education, the curriculum has been restructured and revised Choice Based Credit System is followed.

The curriculum is divided into five parts- Part I, Part II, Part III, Part IV and Part V. Part I offers Languages Tamil, French, Hindi and Sanskrit, Part II is devoted to Learning of English. Part III comprises of Core subjects, Elective subjects and Allied subjects. Part IV includes Non-Major Electives, Skill Based Subjects, Environmental Studies and Value Education. National Service Scheme and Physical Education are offered under Part V.

CURRICULUM



➤ Promoting Environmental Awareness

Environmental Studies create awareness on environment, conservation, bio-diversity and natural resources. The structure and functions of eco-systems are learnt by the students. They also acquire knowledge about bio-diversity, value of bio-diversity, mega-diversity zones, endangered and endemic species of India, threat to bio diversity and conservation of bio-diversity. The students know about different types of environmental pollution, its causes and preventive measures. An awareness is created among the students regarding the social issues such as climatic change, global warming, population explosion, woman and child welfare. The students learn Environmental studies during the V semester.

➤ Inculcating Ethical Values

Value Education programme inculcates values such as values of individual, family and institution, as well as time management and positive thinking in the minds of students. It creates awareness about women issues to face the society confidently. It insists on parental care and concern for elderly people to build a contented society. Ideologies of all religions are learnt from

which communal harmony is developed. The students learn Value Education during the VI semester.

➤ **Creating Social Responsibility**

Social responsibilities are developed through the NSS programme. Regular and Special camping programmes are being organized in the adopted villages by NSS volunteers. It creates Women Empowerment. Educating them with environmental and social issues guide them to lead the society capably. It helps them to undertake communal work. NSS is included in the curriculum in part V for the I and II year students.

➤ **Empowerment Through Physical Fitness**

Physical Education programme leads to attain knowledge about various sports. It also helps to gain physical fitness. It prepares the students for placement in protective forces of Central and State governments. Physical Education is a part of curriculum; I and II year students have physical education classes during the sixth hour. Students can also opt for Physical Education as NME in the I year. Physical education trains players in Chess, Badminton, Kabaddi, Hockey, Handball, Ball Badminton, Basket Ball and Volley Ball in the University Level, State Level and National Level.

Apart from academic programmes the following programmes are also offered:

➤ **Developing the Divine Attributes and Aspects**

The **Spiritual Education** inculcates faith in God, the supreme power. It provides the positive way of approaching life and sense of values to have a balanced mind. Examination on Bagavath Gita enables the students to learn about soul and moral values. Examination on Vivekananda inculcates ethical and social values among the students. Thus spiritual education makes the students pious, develops positive thinking, patience, self confidence, discipline and obedience.

➤ **Enhancing Mental and Physical Strength**

Yoga is practiced by hostel students regularly. I & II year students perform yoga from 7 am to 8 am in the morning and from 4.30 pm to 5.30 pm in the evening. Students practice various Asanas such as Ustrasana, Suria Namaskaram, Padmasana, Padahastana, Purpauttanason, Dhanurasana, Bhujangasana, Shalabhasana, Halasana and Gomukhasana. These

practices provide wide variety of benefits which make the students physically and mentally fit to increase in their self-esteem.

Karate co-ordinates mind and body. Karate can be used as a weapon of self defense in which tremendous physical power is exerted. It develops the self confidence of students and can be used as an excellent form of stress release. Students are trained in 20 kattas like Heian Shodan, Heian Nidan, Heian Sandan, Heian Yandan, Heian gongan, Bassai Dai, Bassai sho, Karku Dai and Karku sho.

➤ **Enlightenment of Truth and Non-Violence**

Certificate and Diploma courses in **Gandhian Thought**(CGT & DGT) offered by Madurai Kamaraj University are being conducted from the year 1985. Students learn about Gandhiji's Life, Non-violence and Sarvodaya. They also learn about Politics, Economics, Religion, Philosophy, Sociology and Educational Theory. Certificate course is offered for all the I year UG students and Diploma course is offered for all the II year UG students.

➤ **Enrichment of Skills**

Self development Course is conducted to enrich the skills which leads to employability. A wide variety of short term programmes such as Baking and food preservation course, Tailoring course, Beautician course, Macrome wire Doll making and Two/Four wheeler driving programmes are offered for the benefit of the students.

➤ **Developing Hidden Talents**

Cultural training helps the students to expose their talents in extra curricular activities. It provides them with unique experience and allows them to interact with each other. Students are trained in classical dance and folk dances like Karakattam, Kavadi Attam, Kazhiya Attam, Peacock dance, Villupattu and Dummy horse. Cultural exchange assists students to develop positive relationship with others and leads to understand a broader range of perspectives.

For PG courses apart from core subjects, elective subjects are also offered. PG students undergo project work and viva-voce during the fourth semester. The curriculum is framed with freedom of autonomy and also as per the rules of the government.

The curriculum is framed in such a way the core values of the programmes and needs of the students are balanced equally. Core subjects build in-depth knowledge among students. Job

opportunity is acquired through skill based courses. Electives are offered to fulfill the students' interest in various subjects.

The college curriculum develops intellectually matured women folk, morally upright women dignitaries, culturally ethical women leaders and spiritually motivated women superiors.

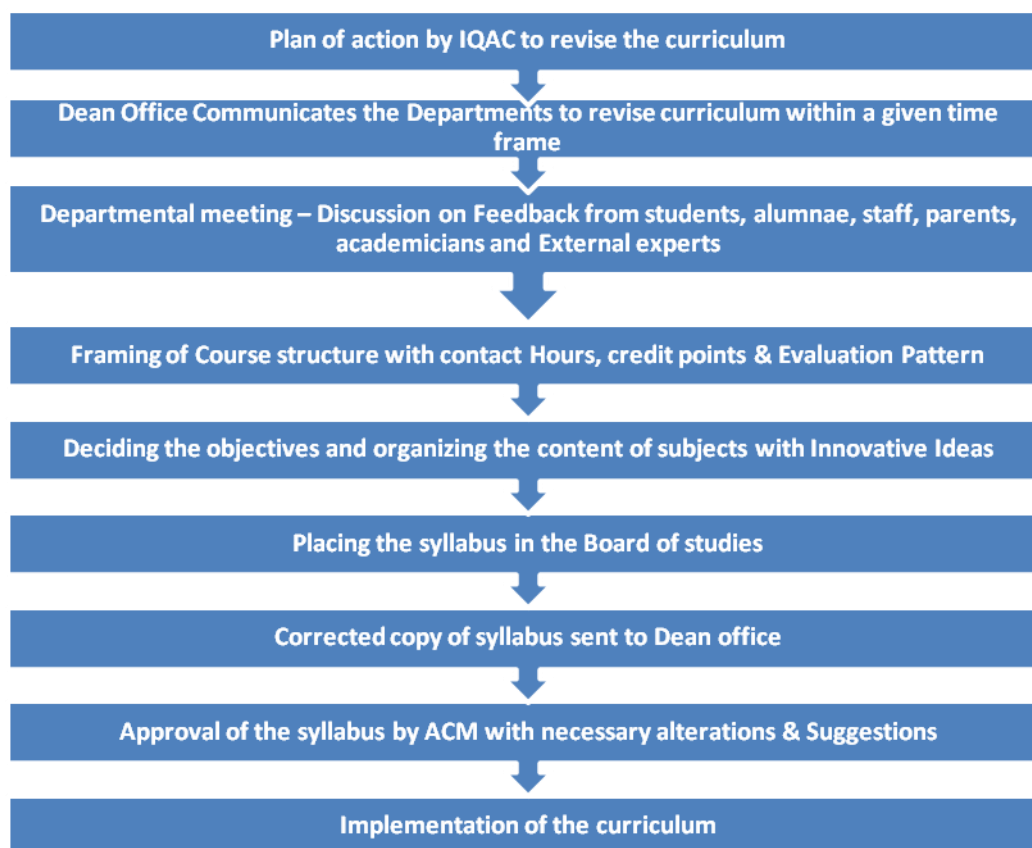

The Curriculum is designed and planned in a systematic manner. The Curriculum developed is dynamic and flexible. It incorporates necessary changes in each revision. The various programmes of the curriculum are modified, taking into consideration, the changing needs and emerging technology.

Before designing the curriculum, the curricular materials are collected from other universities and institutions for study and comparative analysis. Seminars, conferences, workshops and association meetings organized in the college provide a platform to know the current trends. Faculties expose their innovative ideas by attending State, National, International Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. Discussions about the designing of curriculum are made at the departmental meetings. Feedback of curriculum is obtained from the final year students at the end of the academic year and feedback from alumni is also recorded.

CURRICULUM DESIGN MECHANISM



Each department strives to include current trends, innovative ideas, soft skills and self development potentials in their curriculum. The industrialists and professionals contribute their prominent ideas for the development of curriculum. After the collection of valuable ideas from the academicians, industrial experts, alumni, parents, students and staff the curriculum is designed with innovative ideas, current trends and societal needs. The course structure of the curriculum is planned with core subjects, allied subjects, non-major elective subject and skill based subjects. The credit points, contact hours and evaluation pattern are allotted for each subject.

The syllabus content is developed according to the objectives framed and organized with five units with care to include the recent trends. The syllabus is placed in the Board of Studies meeting. The Board includes, University nominee, Subject experts, Industrialist, Faculties and Alumna.

Necessary changes and corrections are made by the members of Board of Studies. Then the syllabus is placed in the Academic Council Meeting for final approval. The Academic Council comprises of Principal as the Chairperson, Dean of the academic affairs, Director of Self Financing courses, the State Government nominee-Joint Director of Collegiate Education, University nominees, External experts, Heads of the Academic & Non-academic departments, Senior staff members, Controller of examinations as special invitee, non-member secretary and students representatives.

The views and the ideas of the members of ACM are taken into account and further corrections are made and finally the curriculum is passed and implemented from the forth coming academic year.

1.1.3 How does the College involve industry, research bodies, and civil society in the curriculum design and development process? How did the College benefit through the involvement of the stakeholders?

Industrialists, Research bodies, Civil society and Subject experts are made to involve in the development of curriculum design.

Role of Industry

Institution-Industry linkage is being established in the departments to involve the industry in the curriculum design. Industrial visits enable the faculty members and the students to include industrial needs in the content of the curriculum. As a part of their curriculum students undergo projects to draw the attention of the industries.

Role of Research Bodies

Research and Development Cell organizes Conferences, Seminars and Guest lectures for the faculty members. Professors and Scientists from various Universities and research bodies contribute significant ideas relevant to current scenario. Every department organizes Research and Development meeting to enrich the research efficiency of the staff and students.

Role of the Society

The requirements of the society are known through the extension activities and societal needs are incorporated in the development of the curriculum. Eminent resource persons in various fields are invited to deliver special lectures organized by the Students Service Organization. Parents offer valuable suggestions at the time of admission of freshers, and during

Parent Teacher Meet. People from neighbourhood community contribute their noble ideas at the time of NSS special camping programme. Thus the students are benefited with empowerment.

Benefits for the college through the stake holders

Based on the suggestions of the members of Governing Council, Academic Council and Board of Studies, Parents, Alumni, Students and Staff, it is possible to start career oriented programmes like Certificate courses, Diploma courses, Self Development Courses, Skill Development Courses and Personality Development Course. With the development of the curriculum the empowerment of students is achieved.

❖ Employability:

The curriculum is designed to meet the emerging needs of present day with special focus on multi skill development of students and various programmes of curriculum contribute much towards the employability of students.

The pursuit of multi-skills-mastery is the need of the hour. The institution emphasizes not only in-depth knowledge in the core subjects but also creates awareness and a mastery of the basics in computer literacy, by incorporating computer related subjects for all Departments in framing the curriculum.

The following subjects provide employability:

Apiculture:- The Department of Zoology offers bee keeping which is a viable route for sources of income, as there is a high demand for honey at national and global scale.

Forensic Chemistry:- The Department of Chemistry provides a subject on Forensic Chemistry which enables the students to work as forensic pathologists.

Entrepreneurship:- The curriculum of the Department of Commerce includes Entrepreneurship to enhance the development of women entrepreneur. It trains the students to become young and energetic entrepreneurs.

Quantitative Aptitude:- The Department of Mathematics offers Quantitative Aptitude which enables the students to face competitive examinations confidently.

VB.Net:- The Department of BCA offers VB.Net to help the students to get more job opportunities in the software companies.

Soft Skills :- The Soft Skills is included in the curriculum of BBA which helps the students to develop their communication skills, inter personal skill and leadership quality which is the route for employability.

Food Product Development:- Food Product Development offered by the Department of Nutrition & Dietetics has practical importance in the regular life and also leads to self-employment.

Journalism and Mass Communication :- Journalism offered by the Department of English and Journalism and Mass communication offered by the Department of Tamil, deals with the nuances of Journalism. It throws light on the skills to be accomplished by a Journalist, Reporter and Editor.

Energy Physics :- The subject Energy Physics offered by the Department of Physics provides vast employability to the students.

PHP:- Hypertext Pre-Processor:- PHP offered by the Department of Computer Science facilitates the students to develop a website which leads to employability.

Tourism:- The Department of History offers Tourism which enables the students to take up tour operating business.

Computer Graphics: - Computer graphics subject offered by the Department of Information Technology helps the students to compete with the current and future needs in the concept of Computer Graphics.

Promoting Employability through specific courses:-

- **Self development courses** – Beautician course, Tailoring course, Food processing, Fabric and glass painting and Two wheeler/ Four wheeler driving courses.

- **Placement and Career Guidance** – Personality development course.
- **Entry in Service** – Training for Competitive examinations.

❖ Innovation:

The courses designed under autonomy are innovative. While framing the curriculum special care has been taken to include the recent concepts and innovative ideas in the subjects. The following are the subjects of innovative curriculum namely Indian Diasporic Literature, Food Toxicology, Disaster Management, Tally, Padaippilakkiam, Nano-Physics, Number Theory, Ornamental fish culture and Mobile computing.

❖ Research :

Historiography, Green and Nano-chemistry, Ilakkiya Thiranaivu, Data mining, Cloud computing, Therapeutic Nutrition, Cryptography and Network security, Quantitative techniques, Graph theory are the research oriented subjects that enable the students to develop their research skills. Research Methodology subject is included in the curriculum of UG(BBA), PG(M.Com(CA) & M.A. English) and M.Phil. The pleasant ambience of our institution enables the research scholars to choose value – oriented topics of current relevance which offers ground for further research and inter – disciplinary research. The institution provides full support and encouragement to the research scholars for the successful completion of their work.

1.1.5 How does College ensure that the curriculum developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national developmental needs?

The currently relevant and up-dated curriculum, suits the regional and national needs by contributing much through the field of teaching, research and software skills. Special focus on national development is ensured by Part IV and Part V Subjects (NSS) and thereby create

awareness regarding the welfare of the nearby community. Professional skills developed through the pursuit of career – oriented and computer – oriented courses contribute towards economic development and upward swing in national growth rate.

Towards Social Needs

The objective of the college is to uplift the socially and economically backward rural women students. Women represent predominant role in the development of the society. Empowerment of women is achievable entirely by rendering them value based and knowledge oriented education. Rural women students are benefited by the educational system of the institution. College admits backward students SC/ST students and disabled students. Part V of the curriculum works out with National Service Scheme in which awareness is built among the public about voting rights, rain water harvesting, disaster management, consumer awareness, AIDS awareness, health and hygiene and Prime Minister welfare schemes. These services are rendered to the nearby village residents by the NSS Volunteers.

Towards regional needs

Majority of the students are from rural areas. To strengthen their English language skill, Spoken English is included as a unit in part II English syllabus and it is mandatory for the I & II year UG students. In addition to that, the Department of English conducts Certificate course in Spoken English. Each Department offers computer subjects to elevate the computer skill of the students. Part IV of the curriculum is comprised of skill based subjects to meet out the demands of the present trend. Subjects such as Quantitative techniques and reasoning ability, English for placement, Soft skill for job seekers, Mobile computing, Journalism, Digital Image processing, Food processing and Bakery and Food preservation are included in the part IV of the curriculum.

Towards National needs.

Hindi is offered in Part I for the UG students. Spoken Hindi classes are arranged for the benefit of the students. Computerized accounting(Tally) minimizes the enormous usage of paper and Energy Physics minimizes electricity consumption. Green & Nano Chemistry subject creates awareness regarding pollution and global warming. Disaster management subject helps the students to face natural calamities. Human rights in Literature guides the students to face the society confidently. Tourism, Epigraphy and Archeology provide a way to know the heritage of India.

1.1.6 To what extent does the College use the guidelines of the regulatory bodies for developing or restructuring the curricula? Has the College been instrumental in leading any curricular reform which has created a national impact?

As per the guidelines of UGC, TamilNadu State Council for Higher Education(TANSCHE) and the Directives of Madurai Kamaraj University, the development and restructuring of curriculum is made accordingly. Yoga classes make healthy generation. Yoga practices increase memory power and synchronization of mind and body.

Value Education is offered in Part IV of the curriculum which makes the students socially responsible as it educates them about parental care, concern for elderly people, faith in religious values and the need for communal harmony.

Special focus on national development is ensured by the Part IV and Part V Subjects (NSS) and thereby create awareness regarding the welfare of the nearby community. Our extended curriculum like NSS make our students realize the hardships of the poverty – stricken villagers and thereby, they imbibe values like social service and compassion.

Professional skills developed through the pursuit of career – oriented and computer – oriented courses contribute towards economic development and upward swing in national growth rate. Two career oriented programmes are offered with the financial support and the guidelines of the UGC. Certificate and diploma courses in Gandhian Thought are mandatory for all the I and II year UG students respectively, to nourish the Gandhian ideologies and principles. b. Enrichment Courses

4. Certificate and Diploma courses in **Gandhian Thought** offered by MKUniversity
Certificate Course in Gandhian Thought(CGT) is offered for all the I year UG students.
Diploma in Gandhian Thought(DGT) is offered for all the II year UG students.
5. **Yoga** classes are mandatory for all the hostel students to develop their physical and mental fitness.
6. Examination on **Vivekananda Thought** by Vivekananda Kendra and **Bagavad Gita** examination by ISKON temple are conducted for the students.
7. **Debates in English and Tamil** are organized for all the students which develop their skill in both the languages. To enrich the vocabulary of all students new words and idiom are displayed in the **students' notice board**. Dictionary and encyclopedia are also displayed which enables easy references for all. Book Review is conducted to make the students to be familiar with new books.

12. Self Development programmes

Self development Course is conducted to enrich the skills which leads to employability. A wide variety of short term programmes such as Baking and food preservation course, Tailoring course, Beautician course, Macrome wire Doll making and Two/Four wheeler driving programmes are offered for the benefit of the students.

13. Cultural Training

Cultural training helps the students to expose their talents in extracurricular activities. It provides them with unique experience and allows them to interact with each other. Students are trained in classical dance and folk dances like Karakattam, Kavadi Attam, Kazhiya Attam, Peacock dance, Villupattu and Dummy horse. Cultural exchange assists students to develop positive relationship with others and leads to understand a broader range of perspectives.

Enrichment courses are conducted to inculcate moral values, religious values and Gandhian ideologies. They also provide mental, social and psychological development of the students. These courses provide environmental awareness, interview facing skills and general awareness.

c) Courses offered in Modular Form

Modular form of curriculum helps the students to understand the conceptual and analytical aspects of the subjects easily. The progressive form of arrangement of the syllabus enables the students to grasp quickly and in-depth study is possible. The modular form of curriculum is being practiced in the Departments of Commerce, History, Zoology, Mathematics, English, Business Administration, Physics and Nutrition & Dietetics. In respect of Commerce stream, the syllabus is divided into problem based and theory based. In the summative examination questions will be asked in the ratio of 80 : 20, or 60 : 40 or 20 : 80 for theory and for problem, it depends upon the importance of conceptual and analytical aspects of the subjects. In case of science subjects theory aspects will be covered by lecture and practical work at the laboratory, 6 hours are allotted for theory and 6 hours for laboratory for the same subject.

Career Oriented program offered by the Department of Commerce and Mathematics are in progressive form, the content of the syllabus is divided into three levels; Certificate course, Diploma course and Advanced Diploma course.

d) Credit transfer and accumulation facility

There is credit transfer facility subject to MKU regulations and TANSCHÉ guidelines. The institution follows TANSCHÉ guidelines and there is no credit accumulation facility.

e) Lateral and Vertical Mobility

The CBCS provides scope for lateral, vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses. I year students have the option to select non-major elective offered by the other departments. II year students have the option to select any one of the certificate course offered by

the other departments. This enables the students to acquire the knowledge of other disciplines and thereby they are facilitated with lateral mobility.

The Vertical mobility is made available to the students of Mathematics, Information Technology, Computer Science, Physics, Commerce, English, Tamil and History. They can do under graduate course and post graduate course in the same discipline. PG students of Commerce and Mathematics can pursue M.Phil.

The students of BCA, Computer Science, and Information Technology can be directly admitted into II year MCA degree course after the completion of their UG courses. This facilitates vertical mobility of students.

Policies regarding self-financed courses:

- (a) **Admission :-** The admission policy for self-financing programme is in tune with the norms fixed by the government for the different categories.
- (b) **Fee Structure :-** Fee structure for aided scheme is furnished in the college calendar. The fee structure for the self-finance students is higher than that of the aided students as it covers the remuneration for the faculty of the self-financed stream.
- (c) **Teacher Qualification:-** The qualification for the faculty of the self-financed programmes is as per the norms of the Tamilnadu Government.

1.2.5 Has the College adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)? If yes, how many programmes are covered under the system?

Yes, all the UG and PG programmes of Aided and Self Financed courses are covered under CBCS pattern.

Autonomous status was granted to the institution in the year 2006. The institution adopted CBCS from the inception of autonomous status. The revised Choice Based Credit System is followed from 2008 onwards. The total credits assigned to UG and PG are 140 and 90 respectively.

The College aims at the development of multi faced talents of students. The students are trained in their major subjects as well as allied subjects. While framing the curriculum each and every department takes care to include inter disciplinary subjects in the syllabus. In the first year, students are motivated to select any one of the **Non-Major Electives(NME)** offered by other departments which goes as well for the second semester. In the second year, students are given chance to select any one of the certificate/diploma courses offered by other departments which is a one year programme. In the curriculum, students study inter disciplinary subject as allied subject. The Department of Computer Application offers Financial Accounting for UG and Accounting and Financial Management for PG students and these subjects are handled by the faculty of Commerce. The faculty of Mathematics handle allied Mathematics subject for the UG students of Physics, Chemistry, Computer Science, BCA and MCA. The faculty of Physics handle allied Physics subject for the Mathematics and Chemistry students. Career oriented programme conducted by the Department of Mathematics and Commerce are offered to the students of all disciplines.

1.3 CURRICULAM ENRICHMENT

The curriculum has been framed according to the vision and mission of the college. In the year 2006, at the time of the introduction of Autonomy, the curriculum underwent a revision from University curriculum to our own design of Choice Based Credit System. In the year 2008, as per the directions from the TamilNadu State Council for Higher Education, the curriculum has been restructured and revised Choice Based Credit System is followed.

Curriculum revision is done once in three years and it is also revised whenever the need arises. Each department takes care to see that the major considerations like the depth of the course content, extent of coverage, relevance to real life situation, learning value, clarity, use of textual materials, use of additional source of materials and efforts required by students are viewed while framing the syllabus. Each revision of curriculum includes recent concepts, knowledge oriented, skill oriented and Job oriented subjects. The objective of the revision of the curriculum is that it should be innovative and flexible and learner centered.

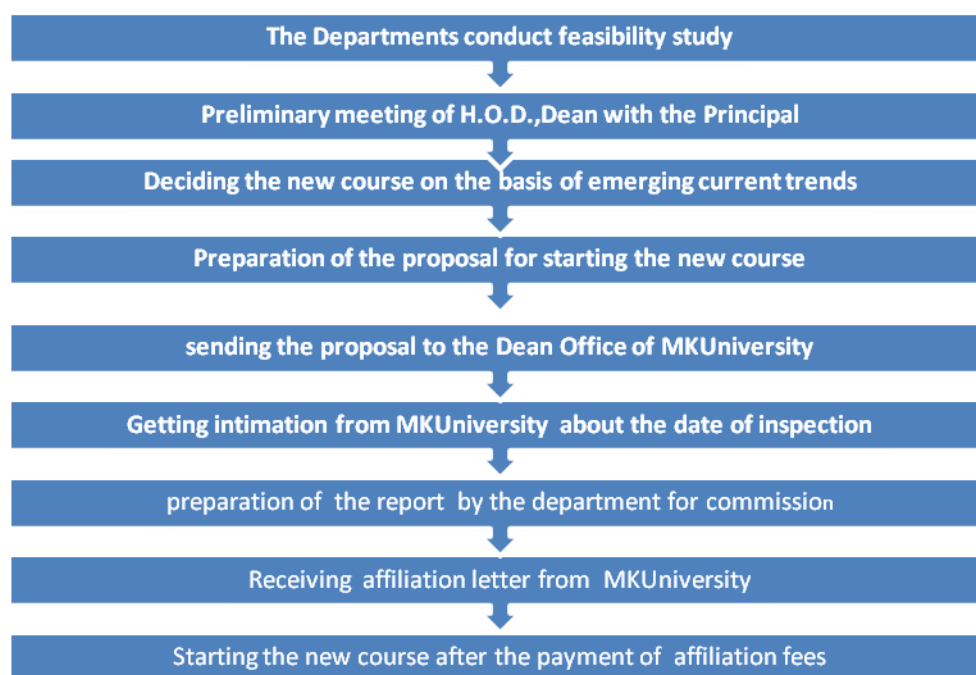

Tourism Business

It enables the students to acquire professional skill and knowledge in the field of Tourism. It offers career opportunities in the field of travel and tourism. It provides training in hospitality, guideship and hotel management. It enables the students to get job both in private and government sectors.

Spoken English

The course enables the students to improve conversational ability, enhances the vocabulary, aids to find the common errors in English, improves pronunciation and helps to achieve effective communication. It instills confidence, self esteem and enables them to face the interview boldly and to face the world audaciously.

Horticulture

It is designed to motivate the students in gardening. It enables them to acquire knowledge about various plants. It equips the students with the methods of growing of gardens, both in indoor and outdoor, kitchen gardening and grass lawn making.

Tally

It helps the students to study the features of Accounting and inventory system using tally. It gives a practical knowledge on Accounting through computers. It enables the students to learn the calculations of Value Added Tax (VAT), Tax Collected at Source(TCS), Tax Deducted at Source(TDS) and payroll accounting.

Operations Research

It helps the students to learn simplex methods, applications of sequencing problem, network scheduling, decision making analysis. It provides confidence and competence with greater speed in solving problems. It is used in many fields like finance, marketing, purchasing, procurement, exploration, research and development.

Hospital Management

It inculcates the sense of humanity in handling patients and helps to understand the peculiarities of hospital administration. Records management followed in the hospitals are trained which helps the students to get placement in various hospitals in different positions.

Journalism & Mass Communication

Students learn about print media, photography, documentary film, caricature and advertisement. Students understand the functions of news agencies and methods of advertising. They get experience in compiling journals. Journalism enables the students to become successful reporters.

Medical Physics

The students understand the design and functioning of various medical equipments. They learn about X-rays, ECG and understand the concepts of Ultrasonic and magnetic techniques. It provides job opportunities in hospitals and research institutes.

Web Designing

Students understand the principles of creating an effective web page and web design. It includes current trends of HTML language, creation of websites to interact with social network.

Image Animation in Flash

It includes graphics and text with animations. It also permits streaming of both video and audio clips. The students learn multimedia concepts using Flash and Flash's interactivity which leads to creation of number of games and animated advertisement.

Food & Nutrition

The students study about the recent trends in diet therapy, planning and preparation of therapeutic diets. It helps the students to understand the concept of balanced diet and meal planning to be followed in day to day life.

Multimedia Technology

The applications of multimedia technology are in the areas of business, entertainment, virtual reality and educational institutions. The course educates the students to create designs in Photoshop and Adobe flash. It improves the creativity and enhances innovative ideas of students in text and image processing.

Food Chemistry

The course helps the students to understand the chemical reactions taking place in food processing and storage. It enables the students to visualize the properties and reactions between food constituents and provides knowledge on Food adulteration and hygiene.

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for the revision of existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a major syllabus revision?

In all disciplines the curriculum is revised once in three years and also revised when need arises. The Board of Studies meeting is conducted within the month of December, every academic year. The members of the Board of Studies are University nominee, two subject experts, industrialist, alumna and the entire faculty. The members of the board make necessary corrections and contribute significant ideas for the revision of existing programme to suit the current scenario. Feedback from the outgoing students and alumnae, contribution from the faculty are taken into account for the revision of syllabus.

Major syllabus revision was made by the Departments of Zoology, Physics and Nutrition & Dietetics. After receiving the feedback from alumni and parents the nomenclature of the programmes Zoology with Biotechnology, Physics with IT and Nutrition & Dietetics with IT were changed into Zoology, Physics and Nutrition & Dietetics respectively. The reason for the change was that the students found it very difficult to pursue Master degree in their discipline and B.Ed degree course as the students were pressurized to get equivalent certificate at the time of admission. To reduce the hardship of the students, these courses were renamed and the revised curriculum was designed.

1.3.4 What are the value-added courses offered by the College and how does the College ensure that all students have access to them?

Value Education

Value Education programme inculcates values such as values of individual, family and institution, as well as Time management and positive thinking in their minds. It creates awareness about women issues to face the society confidently. It insists on parental care and concern for elderly people to build a contented society. Ideologies of all religions are learnt from which communal harmony is developed. The students learn Value Education during the VI semester.

Spiritual Education

The Spiritual Education inculcates faith in God, the supreme power. It provides the positive way of approaching life and sense of values to have a balanced mind. Examination on Bagavath Gita offered by ISKON temple enables the students to learn about God, Soul and moral values. Examination on Vivekananda offered by Vivekananda Kendra inculcates ethical and social values among the students. The Spiritual Education makes the students pious and inculcates positive thinking, patience, self confidence, discipline and obedience.

Gandhian Thought

Certificate and Diploma courses in Gandhian Thought (CGT & DGT) offered by MKU are being conducted from the year 1985. Students learn about Gandhiji's Life, Non-violence and Sarvodaya. They also learn about Politics, Economics, Religion, Philosophy, Sociology and Educational Theory. Certificate course is offered for all the I year UG students and Diploma course is offered for all the II year UG students.

Yoga

Yoga classes are organized for the hostel students. Yoga leads to achieve synchronization of mind and body. It also tends to internal sense of serenity. Yoga is practiced by students regularly. I & II year students perform yoga from 7 am to 8 am in the morning and from 4.30 pm to 5.30 pm in the evening. Students practice various yogasanas such as Ustrasana, Suria Namaskaram, Padmasana, Padahasthasana, Purpauttanason, Dhanurasana, Bhujangasana, Shalabhasana, Halasana and Gomukhasana. These practices provide wide variety of benefits which makes the students physically and mentally fit with increase in their self-esteem.

1.3.5 Has the College introduced any higher order skill development programmes in consonance with the national requirements as outlined by the National Skills Development Corporation and other agencies?

Higher Order Skill development

Higher order thinking skill is developed by organizing **State level Science Expo** every year. The students of Science departments actively participate in the Science Expo and present models relating to their discipline. The models presented were Number game, Diabolic magic square, Tower of Hanoi and Pascal's triangle, Nutrition food pyramid, Industrial pollution, hydraulic bridges, forestry, bio technology, fiber optic communication network, topology, multimedia and animation using Flash. Students presented models on Wealth from waste to make the environment green, based on recycling techniques in industrial waste, domestic waste, contaminated water and paper waste.

The college has a **placement cell** to organize training and orientation programmes to the final year students for placement. They are trained through pre-campus interview in the following areas. Group Discussion, Model Interview, Logical Reasoning and General awareness. All the students of Zoology are trained in **mushroom cultivation** and in **blood group analysis**. A success in mushroom production gives confidence and improves their livelihood. Students of Nutrition & Dietetics are trained in **food processing and preservation** as well they are equipped to **prepare bakery products**. The Department of Commerce offers **Tally** as a Career Oriented Programme and is also included in the curriculum. It enables the students to learn the calculations of Value Added Tax(VAT), Tax Collected at Source(TCS), Tax Deducted at Source(TDS) and Payroll accounting.

IQAC cell organized ICT enabled training programme on **Google Applications for Education**. The students and staff are trained to make effective communication using E-mail ID which would be very helpful in the allocation of assignments & projects, generation of report about students performance and to keep contact with Alumni. The students who missed their classes can learn the lessons through Google Apps. Assignments can also be submitted with the help of this application.

Personality Development Course

Personality Development programme is conducted for all the final year students. All the major students are divided into three batches. Each batch of students attend this course for 20 working days and the duration of the course is 40 hours. Students are trained regarding body language, group discussion, job interview, vocabulary, stress management, time management, writing and speaking skills, self introduction, role play and enacting skit.

A wide variety of short term programmes such as Baking and food preservation course, Tailoring course, Beautician course, Macrome wire Doll making and Two/Four wheeler driving programmes are offered for the benefit of the students.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 Does the College have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

Yes, the college collects feed back on curriculum from the final year UG and PG students of all departments. Feedback is obtained in the following ways.

- Students' counselors come to know about students' requirement through interaction outside the classrooms.
- Students express their views freely in letters, dropped in the Suggestion Box and the grievance redressal cell monitors it.
- Suggestions by the meritorious students are also obtained by the departments.
- Students' views regarding course, performance of the faculty are collected through questionnaires.

The questionnaire of the feedback on curriculum covers 7 parameters. The parameters are depth of course content including project work, extent of coverage applicability/ relevance to real life situations, learning value in terms of knowledge, concepts, manual skills, analytical abilities and broadening perspectives, clarity and relevance of textual reading materials, relevance of additional source material, extent of effort required by students. The students are asked to rate the course using 4 point scaling techniques like **Very Good, Good, Satisfactory and Unsatisfactory**. The overall rating for the course given by the students are taken into consideration while analyzing the feedback. The opinion of the students is evaluated and consolidated report is prepared by each department which will be very useful for the revision of the curriculum.

1.4.2 Does the College elicit feedback on the curriculum from national and international faculty? If yes, specify a few methods adopted to do the same - (conducting webinar, workshop, online forum discussion etc.). Give details of the impact on such feedback.

The Controller of examinations of the college sends the syllabus of all the Departments to the eminent scholars to evaluate it. Their reports will be sent to the respective departments while framing the curriculum. The newly framed syllabus is placed in the Board of Studies meeting for discussion and action. Each department conducts National and International conferences and seminars by inviting eminent academicians and scientists. Views of these experts are included in the curriculum to match with the current scenario.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which alumni, employers, industry experts and community give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

Feedback mechanism relating to curriculum, performance of faculty, evaluation system and infrastructure is done in the following ways.

a. Alumni:

- In the alumni association meetings through questionnaires.
- Their representation in academic bodies.
- Their interaction with the junior students.
- Voluntary help to the college.

b. Employers/Industries

- During Boards of Studies and Academic council.
- Their opinions are gathered at the time of campus interviews.
- Resource persons' opinions, expressed in the VIP Register, at the time of guest lectures, seminars and conferences.

c. Community:

- During students' admission, Parent Teacher meetings, parents and community register their views orally and in written form. Parents of I year students attend orientation programme. Parent teacher meeting is being organized twice in a year to discuss about the performance of their wards in the summative examination. Feedback is collected from the parents regarding the courses offered, self employment courses, skill oriented courses, students and staff relationship and facilities available in the college. The parents contribute significant ideas for the betterment of students and the college.
- Suggestions are obtained from nearby community during N.S.S special camps.

All the departments include alumni as the members of the Board of Studies. The industrial experts play a vital role in Board of Studies, Academic Council and IQAC. The views of industrial experts, parents and alumni are taken into account in the enrichment of curriculum.

1.4.4 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the institution in ensuring effective development of the curricula?

Academic audit is conducted by the Controller of Examinations regarding the validity of syllabus by the subject experts, to scrutinize the content of the syllabus. The views of the experts are taken into account while restructuring the curriculum. This process is also monitored by the IQAC. The curriculum cell organizes guest lectures on Innovative curriculum, Modern teaching methods and e-content development for the faculty. The eminent faculty from other universities and institutions are invited as resource persons. These lectures enable the institution to keep the curriculum design on par with the standards of other universities. To improve the skills and abilities of the faculty, the college conducts faculty development programmes and skill development programmes. Students and staff members are motivated to participate in the

conferences/workshops and seminars. The initiatives taken by the institution help to maintain and enhance quality education.

Additional Information regarding Curriculum aspects which the institution would like to include .

1. The institution provides opportunities for the staff and students to undergo research programmes.
2. All the departments conduct quiz, paper presentation and organize guest lectures and seminars to elicit the skills of the students.
3. Guest lectures on e-content development, e-learning resources and e-learning tools and techniques are organized by the curriculum cell that motivates the students and staff to be abreast with the latest educational techniques.
4. The curriculum content of the college plays a vital role in the wholesome development of the skills and personality of the students. The entire curriculum structure is innovative and dynamic so as to meet the needs of the present and prospective students.

Thus the missions of the college and quality curriculum are achieved by the valuable contribution of academicians, industrial experts, parents and stakeholders.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

A Committee is framed as detailed below and it helps the entire admission process under the chairmanship of the Principal. The admission process strictly adheres to the guidelines of the Tamil Nadu Government.

The constitution of the committee is as follows.

Principal: Chairman.

Two Senior Most Assistant/Associate Professors

One Senior Most Assistant/Associate Professors belonging to **SC/ST**

All Heads of the Departments.

The complete details of the various programmes are displayed in the website, through advertisement and Newspapers.

The applications are issued on the cost specified by Tamil Nadu Government. The various programmes and eligibility criteria are mentioned clearly in the **prospectus**. Based on Government norms, **SC/ST applications** are issued at **free of cost**.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place for UG, PG and Ph.D programmes by the college. Explain the criteria for admission (EX. (i) Merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test, and interview ,(iv) common test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) others followed by the college?

According to the guidelines of Tamil Nadu government the college follows a systematic process for admission of students in various programmes. The college prepares a **merit list** as directed by the Government and admission is done based on the list.

UG Merit based admission

The students are admitted in UG courses according to the merit in the **Higher Secondary examination**. No entrance Test is conducted. The students under **Reservation Policies** are given priority for admission.

PG Merit based admission

An UG degree under the reservation policy of the Government is mandatory for PG admission.

A PG degree and **entrance test** is mandatory for M.Phil admission.

Guidelines for admission

- The admission process is fully computerized.
- The selected candidates list will be placed in the college notice board.
- The selected candidates are individually informed through a postal card.
- Counseling will be given to each candidate by the admission committee on their academic programme. Interviews are conducted for both selected candidates and their parents by the Selection Committee.

2.1.3 Does the college have a Mechanism to review its Admission Process and Student Profiles Annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contribute to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the admission committee makes a detailed profile of the admission. Remedies are taken in the admission process which will be followed for the upliftment of the college in the forth coming academic year

2.1.4 What are the Strategies adapted to Increase/Improve Access to Students

Belonging to the following categories SC/ST, OBC, Women, Different categories of Persons with Disabilities, Economically Weaker sections Outstanding Achievers in Sports and Extracurricular Activities?

For both UG and PG programmes, the reservation Policies of the government to admit the candidates notified as 18 + 1 = 19% for SC/ST 30+20 = 50% for other backward classes and 31% for general category, are strictly adhered.

Bridge course

Bridge course is conducted for all the **first years** at the beginning of the programme.

All technical terms in English of the subject concerned are provided with equivalent terms in Tamil.

Five day training is given to students to make them familiar with technical terms in English. Thereby, students from rural areas with schooling in Tamil medium are benefited. This course provides a conducive learning atmosphere, and facilitates equal opportunities of mingling with the peer group.

Remedial Courses

Equal opportunity and guidelines are given, so that they can mingle with their peers in learning. All the departments conduct remedial courses to slow learners. Special remedial classes, simplified course materials, teaching the difficult concepts in Mother-tongue, Clearing their doubts outside the classroom and peer team students tutorial systems are the specific strategies adopted to help the slow learners.

The department of Mathematics and Commerce conduct add-on carrier oriented programmes after the working hours.

A set of **25** students is assigned with a Tutor (Student’s Counsellors) who will take care of the **attendance, academic performance, interpersonal relationship** in the class and other aspects within the campus.

The **Counselling Cell** offer **individual counselling** for the students by **professional counsellors** from **TOPKIDS** since **2012**. Counselling session has been arranged on alternate

Fridays of every month from 10 am to 4 pm. The Students identified with problem that cannot be handled by the tutors (Student’s counsellors) are directed to meet the professional counsellors.

Apart from the Internal counselling programme, Grievance Redressal & Counselling cell of our college conducts periodically awareness programmes for the students on “how to prevent themselves from internal and external problems” and “how to face it in case of Problems”. Dr.Deep from TOPKIDS organises Counselling Programme every month at our premises. He actively steers the whole programme by professional counsellors.

In order to develop our students Entrepreneurial skills, Self- Development cell organised “**Beautician Course**” for a period of three months. Students were taught the nuances of Waxing, Threading, Bleaching, Skin Treatment, Hair Care, Hair Cut, Mehendi and different types of Hair Styles.

To motivate the Entrepreneurial skills of our students Courses such as **Tailoring, Embroidery, Fabric Painting and Jewellery Making** are also being organised by the Self development cell.

Science Expo

State Level Science Exhibition is organized by our college on the occasion of Science Day, 28th February annually. All the Science department Students exhibit a gamut of models on

the way of “**Science Expo**”. The exhibition is also visited by the nearby rural school children. Prize and certificate are awarded to the best models.

Industrial Visit

Each department plan and organize industrial visit for the development of students

- Department of Zoology arranged a field trip for to Horticulture college and research centre, Periyakulam. Bio-logical methodologies and the horticulture techniques were taught to the students through this trip.
- A field trip to Bee farm at Kondagampatti was arranged.
- Visit to WASH(Water Sanitation and Hygiene) institute and Kodaikanal.
- Department of Commerce arranged industrial visit to **Aavin**.
- Department of Chemistry visited **Pharma Fabrikon** Unit II, Vilathur, Madurai for the industrial visit. The students learnt the process of manufacturing medicines, syrups, and also the process involved in ultra-violet, infra-red and spectrophotometer.

2.3.12. Does the college have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students/ Alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching – learning process?

Each year the students observe the performance of the teachers in the class and give their feedback based on the **subject knowledge, clarity** and **ability to provide information**. Their communication skill (the ability to convey fluently), teaching aids used by the teachers, completion of the syllabus without lagging behind, **punctuality** (attending the class on time), functional transparency and motivating inspiring the wards are valued by the students. The students have to record their observation by denoting 3 point scale, (**V.Good**-5 points, **Good** – 3 points, Fair-1 point). These observations are taken into consideration by the principal who guides and helps the course teachers to develop the quality of teaching. The feedback of the students creates a favorable impact on the teaching-learning process.

Alumni are also allowed to suggest about curriculum, teaching and learning process, infrastructure facilities, examination mechanism and campus living. The faculty members are able to analyse themselves and help them to develop their teaching methodology by the informal rapport with alumni. To discuss important issues relating to teaching methodology, resource persons are invited to promote the teaching and learning process.

Orientation programme is organized by the institution specially for newly appointed teachers. The following aspects are discussed in the programme, (i) teaching and learning, (ii) preparation of study materials (iii) curriculum construction, Question bank preparation. The teachers are vastly benefited through this programme.

As the number of working days in a semester is fixed as 90 days, autonomous status of the institution facilitates to complete working days and there by curriculum without any hurdles.

The college has a Central library and Departmental libraries. On working days the students are allowed to make use of the central library from **9.30a.m to 5.00 p.m.** On holidays the library functions between **10.a.m and 4.00 p.m.**

The faculty members guide the students to make use of the library beneficially and to inculcate and develop reading skill.

To augment the teaching-learning process in teachers and students, the Library provides numerous copies of books on competitive Examinations, journals, variety of magazines and also Educational C.Ds and e-books

Evaluation of academic performance of the teachers is done by the Heads of each department.

The Principal visits each department and supervise the teachers performance .The quality of teaching and teaching methods are also evaluate by the Board of studies and confirmed by the Academic Council. The Students' performance is enhanced by the gradual improvement in quality teaching.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

Maximum care is taken in the conduct of the examinations, both Continuous Assessment (internal) and Summative (external), as evaluation process is one of the foremost component in maintaining the authenticity of autonomous curriculum. Continuous Assessment Evaluation is on the basis of Tests, Assignment, Seminars and Practical. Centralized Internal Tests are conducted two times in a semester.

2.5.1 How does the college ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation process that are operative?

Awareness of all stake holders about the evaluation process:

- The evaluation processes are communicated to the students of all disciplines through the orientation programme conducted in the general assembly by the controller of examinations. The course teachers are intimated about the evaluation process through the Heads of the departments. The evaluation processes are elaborated to the students by the course teachers.

- Students are issued with copies of syllabus, blueprint etc. by the respective department.
- The college calendar is furnished with the details of internal and external marks to be obtained, passing minimum, distribution of credits, attendance, re-totaling and revaluation of answer scripts, supplementary examinations and other related details, Students, Management Members and Staff are provided with this calendar.
- Details of Continuous Assessment, the Summative Examination Schedules and the Fee Details are given in the college calendar and also displayed on the notice board.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the college and to what extent have they been implemented in the college? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?

Major evaluation reforms initiated and implemented with examples:

Being an autonomous institution, the college periodically carries out evaluation reforms and some of the reforms implemented successfully are:

- Two continuous assessment tests are conducted and the average marks are added with Assignment / Viva Voice / Seminar and entered in the Continuous Assessment Sheet.
- Students are issued with valued Internal Test Answer Sheets. In case of any discrepancy, they can bring it to the knowledge of the course teacher and it will be rectified.
- Valuation is done by the external examiners for both UG and PG.
- Dummy Number System is followed for valuation.
- Results are prepared and reviewed at the Heads of Departments Meeting for Preliminary Scrutinization prior to Awards Committee Meeting.
- After the approval by the Awards Committee, the results are published in the college website, displayed in the students notice board and a copy is sent to the respective department.

- Regarding the external evaluation, after the publication of results, the students can apply for photo copy of the valued answer scripts and they can also apply for re-totaling and revaluation.
- Moderation process is carried out by distribution of the weightage of an out of syllabus question to other question.
- One - mark moderation is being given, if a student fails by a need of one mark to get a pass, when internal and external marks put together with external passing minimum.
- The letter (F) is replaced by (RA) in the mark sheets indicating failure in the subject concerned.
- Supplementary Examination is conducted during each semester.
- All the above reforms have positive impact on the system.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

Measures for continuous evaluation of the students and their progress:

- Two centralized internal tests are conducted in a phased manner per semester along with one Open Book Assignment for UG (and seminar for PG) all of which are mandatory.
- Extra coaching classes are given for Slow Learners through Remedial Coaching, Peer Team Teaching etc.

- Records for Practical are maintained by the students neat presentation procedures adopted, data work, materials required and outcome of results are the strategies to evaluate the laboratory work through record.

Declaration of Examination Schedules:

The exact date of commencement of examination for both semesters of an academic year is provided in the calendar itself. The schedule of examination is prepared by the Controller of Examination and the same is placed in the Heads of Departments meeting headed by the Principal and got approved. Once the timetable is finalized, the college adheres to the declared examination schedule strictly unless there is unforeseen holidays declared by the Government and under such circumstances, examinations are rescheduled. Thus, real autonomy is exercised in all areas of learning.

Average Time for Declaration of Examination Results and Mode of its Publication:

Results will be published within **10 days** after the completion of all examinations. The result is approved in the Awards Committee meeting along with the University nominees. The results will be published in the college campus and also will be posted in the website. A copy of the same is given to the respective departments.

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following process?

- ❖ Pre-examination processes-Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- ❖ Examination process-Examination material management, logistics.
- ❖ Post examination process-Attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

Integrated Examination Platform:

The office of the Controller of examinations (COE) is in-charge of the entire examination process. The entire examination process of the college is computerized. Complete automation is the strength of the office of the controller of examinations.

Pre – Examination Process

Students and faculty are involved in the pre-examination process in which a systematic approach is followed.

- After the completion of admission process, major wise students list is generated and Register Number for each student is assigned.
- In the beginning of each semester, the scheme of examination, the syllabus copy of the subject, model question paper and check list are given to the respective Department Heads, for verification and approval.
- All Staff Members are directed to prepare and submit Question Banks.
- Regarding the payment of examination fees, students are insisted to pay their fees within the stipulated time, i.e. during the first week of **September & February** for Odd and Even semesters respectively. The details of examination fees, and the last date of payment without and with fine are displayed in the notice board. A printed chalan consisting all particulars are generated and given to all the students in which they can pay the fees through KVB bank (functioning within the campus).
- Once the last date for the payment of examination fee is over, final list of students who have paid the fees and who are eligible to appear for the examination is prepared.
- The Summative Examination Time Table is prepared by the controller of examinations and displayed in the college notice board, in the college website and a copy is also sent to all departments.

- The question paper setting for Summative Examination is done by External Examiners. The documents such as blue print, model question paper, syllabus and study materials (if any) are sent to the external examiners for the purpose of question setting. Two sets of questions are set for all courses and are maintained confidentially for random selection.
- Question paper printing and making copies is done exclusively by the COE's Office.
- Hall tickets are generated for the eligible candidates, ten days before the commencement of the Summative Examination, and they are issued to the students one week before the commencement of examination. The hall ticket contains name of the student, photograph, course of study, register number, subject codes for which the student is appearing.

Preparatory Arrangements:

- Examination schedule and the teacher's duty schedule for invigilation of examinations and attendance sheets for students are prepared in advance by the office of controller of examinations.
- Seating arrangements for examinations are planned in advance, and executed as per plan.
- The students are oriented towards examination procedure (i.e.) time of assembling, discipline to be maintained inside the examination hall, punishment for malpractice and the other related details.
- The teachers are oriented towards examinations procedure by the Controller of Examinations and the Principal, before the commencement of summative examination.

Examination Process:

- Validation of question papers and syllabus are being done by external experts.
- Photocopies of all the question papers are made ready in sealed covers with subject code, title of the subject, date and session under the supervision of the Controller of Examinations.

- On the day of examination, one external examiner will acknowledge the opening of the question paper packets daily. Confidential handling of question paper is ensured by following this procedure.
- Each Question paper and scheme is validated by the respective course teacher on the day of conduct of examination.
- Safe keeping of answer scripts.
- Arrangement of halls for the valuation of answer scripts.

Post examination Process:

- Centralized valuation of the answer scripts by the external examiners for UG and PG. Double valuation for M.Phil.
- Dummy numbers are assigned to the answer sheets.
- Central valuation is commencing on the second of the Commencement of Examination.
- Verification of allotment of marks both individually and totally.
- Verification of marks to ensure accuracy by the Controller of Examinations Office Staff.
- Results are prepared and placed in the Heads of Department Meeting for preliminary scrutinisation prior to Awards Committee Meeting.
- Fixing the date for the meeting of Awards Committee for Approval and Publication of Results.
- Marks statements are prepared with the following security features – photo of the student, hologram, invisible logo, bar-coding, micro printing and twisted name.
- Issue of marks statement to the students.

- Uninterrupted power supply with UPS.
- Telephone facility and internet connection.
- Maintenance of a database for external examiners of all disciplines.
- System of Examination is highly confidential.

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

Mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation:

- The valued answer scripts of two internal tests and the valued scripts of assignments are distributed to students for verification. Internal assessment evaluation results are verified and signed by the students as a mark of her acceptance of evaluation.
- Transparency is assured for summative evaluation, through the facilities such as a provision for reevaluation and/or getting photocopies of answer scripts, in case, the student is not satisfied with the evaluation. The students can bring any grievance regarding evaluation to the notice of the Controller of Examinations, through the Head of the Department concerned.
- Any dissatisfaction with regard to internal assessment will be rectified with the help of the Course teacher.

- ❖ Supplementary exam is conducted for the students those who fail in the exam.

experts and **Selection Committee** members from various universities. The faculty members are appreciated for the consultancy provided through coaching classes in computer literacy, communication skills, handling classes for competitive examinations.

Department of Zoology provides consultancy service on **Mushroom Cultivation, Vermi Compost** and they generated an income by selling at nominal cost to the outsiders. It also generates income through Blood Group Analysis among college Students and Public.

3.6 EXTENSION ACTIVITIES AND INSTITUTIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (ISR)

The College is very well aware of the social responsibility and higher education. Higher education should be firmly rooted in the **local soil** and it is ultimately meant for the well-being of the common people. The present students can become future leaders provided they are exposed to the present harsh social realities and the institutions ought to inculcate values for an egalitarian society. A mere bookish knowledge would not help students become future leaders with social responsibilities.

- The Institution's responsibility and commitment to the community is reflected in its vision and mission statement. This commitment is translated into action through various programmes. The college treats extension activities as a part of Curriculum and Development. **Students' Union** and **Staff Club** provides opportunities to faculty to learn the **Institutional Values, Professional Ethics and Social Responsibility**.
- Active **Student's Union** ensures the continuum of legacy of the college. It conducts frequent meetings to the representatives of all classes to create a healthy college atmosphere.

- Weekly Assembly for the college community (staff and students) – All information related to students support measures, **inter and intra college competitions, campus cleaning, Dress code, ban of plastics, ban of using cell phone inside the college campus** are informed regularly during the assembly which is conducted on every Friday.
- **Inter Religious Prayer** – The assembly starts with the Prayer song; versus from the Bhagavat Gita, The Quran and the Bible are read with its equalent meaning, which enables the students to know the versus from the Holly Books.
- Ragging Free Campus is achieved through efforts to sensitize students to the issue of ‘ragging’
- Students are thoroughly informed about the scholarships available to them. The administrative office of the college takes sincere efforts to distribute scholarship to the students on time.
- The college recognizes the need for refresher courses for the teachers. Whenever the communication comes related to this aspect the staff members are encouraged to attend the programmes.
- Placement Cell, Special Cell for Students Career and counseling, **NSS Units, Youth Red Cross, Parent’s Teacher’s Association, Red Ribbon Club, Consumer Club and IQAC** of the college pave way to have institutional and social responsibility among faculty and students. They are encouraged to participate and promote extension activities focusing on **Green and clean campus programme, adaption of villages, Literacy programme, Blood donations camps, Traffic regulation activities, AIDS awareness programmes, Personality development programmes and Science Exhibitions etc.,**
- Mostly the college sensitizes its faculty and students on social responsibilities by creating awareness through rallies, Human chain, issuing pamphlets with awareness information on days of National Importance in nearby villages.

3.6.2 How does the college promote College-neighbourhood network and student engagement, contributing to holistic development of students and sustained community development?

NSS, Red Ribbon Club, Youth Red Cross Society units are actively functioning in the College and they have developed a well knitted network with the neighbourhood through students’ involvement in community development programmes and camps. Students gain

knowledge related to various social issues and the techniques to identify the problems. Their involvements in the community help them not only for their overall development but also for the sustained community development. A group of committed faculty members is given responsibilities to engage students in the community development programmes in various ways:

- ❖ Neighboring villages and schools have been adopted for the development of rural students and sustained community development
- ❖ College collaborates with the local service agencies that serve the society, thereby promoting partnership and networking. The students are involved in activities like scribing, tutoring to rural children, donating blood and participating in rallies to create awareness on social concerns.
- ❖ Conducting coaching classes to the nearby school students.
- ❖ Conduct of Science Exhibitions, Kalloori Santhai for SHGs, General medical camp
- ❖ The annual seven day NSS camp conducted in selected villages create a healthy rapport between the college and the community. In order to create a healthy atmosphere, medical camps, health awareness programmes and awareness programmes on nutrition and hygiene are regularly conducted
- ❖ The students and staff members of various departments are constantly engaged in organizing literacy camps for school children who belong to weaker sections of the society.
- ❖ The staff and students counsel and create awareness on family planning among the village women. They insist the importance of health and hygiene for the welfare of the village people.
- ❖ Our students maintain and clean surroundings of road and school in nearby village. Village people were benefited by the medical camps conducted by the students in the NSS camp. 5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

The highlights of this criterion are the efforts of the institution in providing necessary assistance to students, to acquire meaningful experiences for learning in the campus and to facilitate their holistic development and progression. It also looks into students' performance, alumni profiles, the progression of students to higher education and gainful employment. The faculty members are striving to implement high quality education efficiently to young women and to keep up a vibrant academic life with innovative programmes and co-curricular activities.

5.1.1. Does the College have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

Yes, the college has an independent system for the student support and mentoring.

The student support services are offered by all faculty members, various unit co-ordinators and hostel warden. All the programmes are organized under the guidance of the President and Secretary, the Principal, Director, Administrative Officer, Dean of Academic Affairs and Controller of Examination.

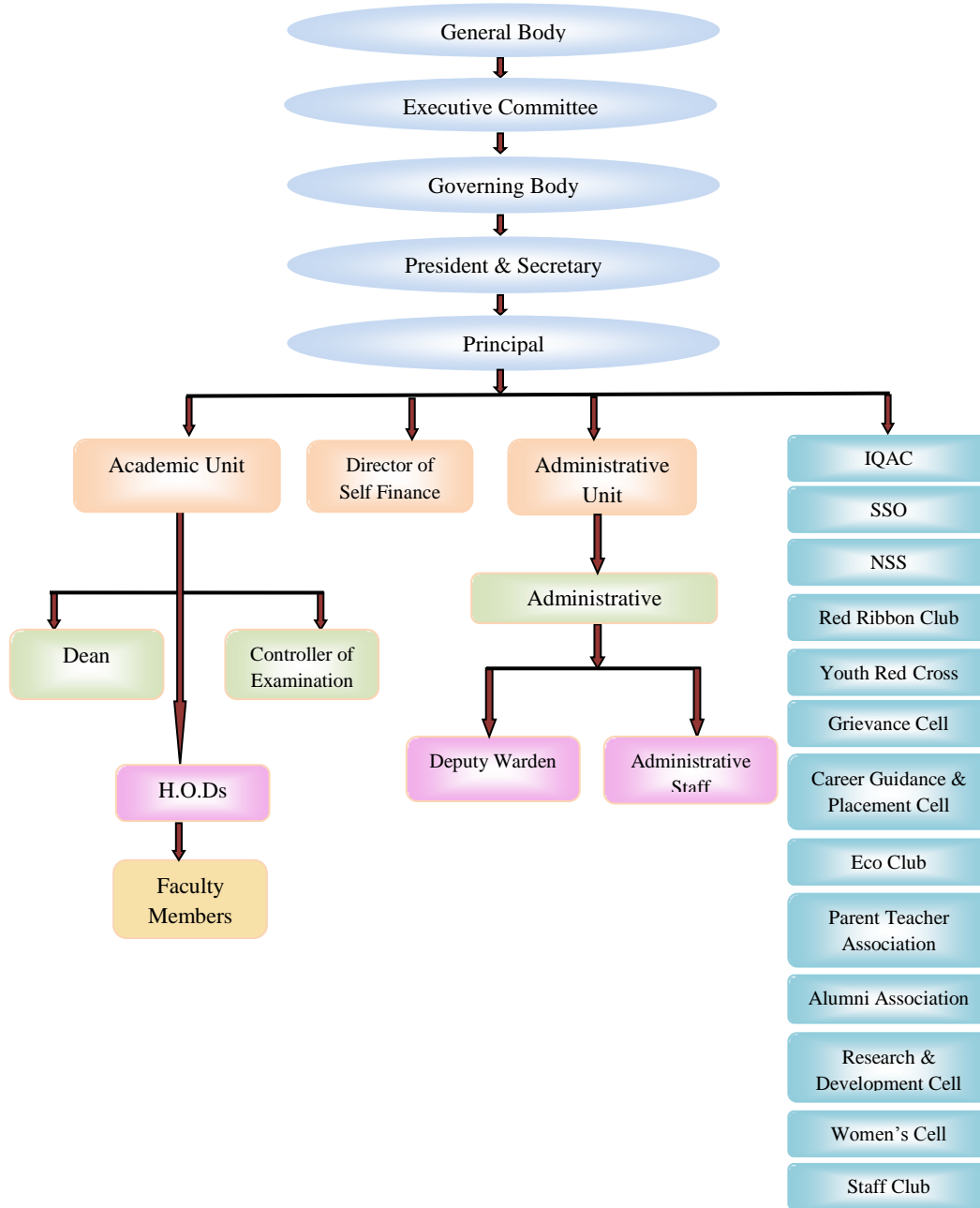
Facilitating mechanisms like **Placement Cell** and **Grievance Redressal Cell** are the welfare measures to support students. Specially designed inputs are provided to the **needy students** with learning difficulties. Students are benefitted by the **bridge course and value added courses**. The institution has a well structured, organized guidance and counseling system.

Student Counselors:

The college counseling service helps the students to overcome their problems in order to develop and fulfill their personal potential. This service is rendered to the students' community at free of charge and it is confidential. According to this system, faculty gives psychological support to the students in the following ways:

- To get relieved from depression
- To alleviate stress/anxiety
- To recover from problems with self identity
- To retain good relationships

- To encompass their issues from the past or present which hinder the students capacity to function.



Academic Mentors:

Mentoring is a youth development strategy that creates a pathway to successful adulthood which also enables to choose a suitable career for them.

- A **mentor** has a maximum of 20 to 25 students (**Mentees**) allocated to each faculty by the institution.
- The mentees are given care by the same mentor for the entire course of study.
- The mentors meet the mentees regularly (**last Friday of every month**) and record the outcome of the meetings in the **Cumulative record** system. The details about each mentee is recorded and updated periodically in the above system.
- The mentors **update the progress** of the mentees, attendance, behavioural changes and their academic performance to their parents.

The students are free to contact their mentors, to share their problems related to academic and personal. The mentor addresses and responds to all the academic and non-academic challenges of the students. The counselors extend services to the students in Career Guidance and organize lectures concerning career planning. The unsolved problems of the mentees are directed to the professional counseling.

Hostel Warden:

The College campus has **three hostels – Mulayam Singh Yadav Hostel, E.M.G. Petchiyammal Memorial Hostel and Meenakshi Hostel**. Approximately, **940 students** are given admission in this year. Admission in the hostel is granted strictly on the basis of merit and proximity.

- The head warden regularly visits the hostel to interact with the students.
- The sick students are taken care during emergency and are informed to the parents/ local guardian and also to the head of the institution/department.
- The warden verifies attendance and academic performance of the students
- The institution maintains and ensures a ragging free hostel.
- Every year, **Students' Hostel Committee** is formed. Through this committee, the students themselves lay down in appropriate norms of behavior to suit different situations and social occasions in the hostel.
- Special care is given to the students, those who observe fasting and food is provided according to their needs.
- The institution is appointed with a **qualified nurse** for the medical assistance. In case of emergency, the warden takes the students to the nearby hospital.
- Wi-Fi facility is available for the boarding students.
- During regular working days, parents are not allowed to take their wards out of the campus.
- Every room is provided with **the newspaper regularly**.
- The hostel students are trained in various extra-curricular activities like **Karate, Taekwondo and Hindi**.
- **Yoga** is mandatory to all students.

- Study hours are meticulously followed in the hostel from **5.30 p.m. to 07.30 p.m.** and **09.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m.** every-day and students are monitored by the warden.

Parents – Teachers Meet:

Parents -Teachers Meet is organized **twice** in an academic year. Initially the wellbeing Counselor of the institution convenes the parents regarding students' comportment. In addition, the ward with their parents meets the academic tutors in their respective department and deal with previous academic performance. Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular activities are brought to the notice of the parents in the PTA Meetings. The Mark Statements of their wards are issued to acknowledge their academic status. It also creates a pathway to express their views about the general functioning of the organization and to have good rapport with the institution.

5.1.2 What provisions exist for academic mentoring apart from class room work?

Apart from classroom interactions, there are ample opportunities for the students to develop and grow in their academic and other related fields.

- The academic profile of every student is maintained in their respective department in **Cumulative Records**.
- **Remedial coaching** for **SC/ST, Minority students** and for **Slow Learners** are scheduled and conducted by a separate cell consists of two members from each department.
- Faculty members are available in the faculty rooms from **3.00 p.m. to 4. 00 p.m.** for academic mentoring. Students meet their subject teachers and clarify their doubts.
- The institution/departments, frequently organizes National and International level Seminars, Workshops, Symposiums, Conferences, Paper Presentations, Projects and Exhibitions, where the students get opportunities to interact with experts in their respective fields. Students are exposed to in-depth subject knowledge and other multilevel tasks through the above mentioned errands.
- Students update themselves on recent trends and developments in the subjects by participating in the training programmes such as **Entry in Service, NET/SET coaching** and **presenting papers** in the **State/National Level Seminars** and Inter-Collegiate competitions.

- Advanced learners are motivated to present papers in the State/National level Conferences.
- The students are guided to prepare their projects, making models, seminars and extra references.

5.1.3 Does the College provide personal enhancement and development schemes for students? If yes, describe techniques employed e.g., career counseling, soft skill development, etc.

Yes, the College has several personal enhancement and development schemes wherein the students get opportunities for personal enhancement and growth. The **Placement and Training Cell** provides guidance and counseling facilities to all the students. The cell organizes special lectures and workshops related to soft skills and personality development. It also makes arrangements for preparing the students for job opportunities and to acquire employability skills. The training programme is arranged for the students in exclusive division.

Placement and Career Guidance Cell

- Placement and Career Guidance Cell with a team of faculty members is functioning for the employability of the students.
- All final year students are **divided into groups** and **trainings** are given for **forty hours**. Through this training, the students take decisions on Higher Education and employment options.
- It focuses self awareness on career opportunity and to develop effective career decision-making skills before setting career goals.
- The Placement Cell enhances the employability of the students by conducting specialized training in **mathematical ability** and a range of skills like **aptitude, analytical, technical, communication, interview, resume writing, group discussion** and **professional training**.
- The Placement Cell organizes **On- campus and Off-campus** drives and guides them to clear competitive Examination.
- A training programme on **Spoken English** is given for the freshers and a one day special programme on **Life Skills** is also organized for all the students every year.

Soft Skills Development:

The College offers communicative skills through **Part II English**. Certificate Course in **Spoken English** and UGC sponsored **Career Oriented Certificate Course**, Diploma and Advanced Diploma Courses are offered by various Departments to cater to the needs of the students in employability.

The college conducts Orientation Programme for all first year students. The purpose of this one day programme is to familiarize them with the various aspects of College campus life, leading to meaningful participation during the course of study.

Health awareness programme and programmes relating to soft skills development are rendered by every department.

Self – Development Course:

This programme aims at developing the **entrepreneurial skills** among the students through various Courses such as **Beautician, Tailoring, Driving, Food Preservation and Demonstration of Home Products**. Orientation on career prospects and recruitment strategies are rendered to the students.

Impact:

These activities help in boosting self confidence of the students which further enhances the development of their entrepreneurial skills.

Women’s Cell:

“**Empowerment of Women**” is the motto of the cell and it is realized through special lectures on women’s rights and role of women in society. Various competitions and rallies are organized on issues related to women.

Academic Counseling:

The academic performance of each student is monitored by the course teacher. The cumulative record is maintained by the mentor who imparts personal and academic guidance. Academic guidance is given to both the slow and advanced learners by the course teachers and they are properly channelized for their improvement. The students are motivated and guided for pursuing higher education according to their choice and capabilities.

Entry in Service:

The cell functions with the noble intention of helping the **SC, ST and Minority Community** students in their academic pursuit and placement. **Remedial coaching** to the slow learners, **NET / SET coaching** for PG Students, coaching for **entry into services** and **Competitive Examinations** (Bank / VAO / TNPSC / TRB / TET) are some of the services of the cell conducted through UGC sponsored programmes. Every Thursday, **Manitha Neyam IAS Academy** conducts coaching classes from **3.00p.m to 4.00 p.m.**

Library:

Library is a growing organism, more and more number of Books and Journals are being added in the College Library. The library subscribes daily news papers and magazines, relating to different subjects. Audio and video cassettes, back volumes of periodicals are available. An open access system of reference for easy accessibility is available for all students.

Life Training Programmes

Gandhian Thought:

Gandhian Thought is incepted in the college from **1985**. Examination on **Certificate Course in Gandhian Thought** and **Diploma Course in Gandhian Thought** of Madurai Kamaraj University are conducted in the college, every year. Students undertake the course to imbibe truth, ahimsa, discipline and the principles of Gandhiji, passionately. The college takes **pride** for having **outnumbered** the students of other colleges in attempting the examination and

facilitated with the **Rolling Shield** consecutively for **four years by Madurai Kamaraj University**.

Diploma and Certificate Courses in Gandhian Thought are conducted in the college campus. Diploma course for II year students and Certificate course for I year students are mandatory.

- The feedback of the **Principal imparts appreciation** and motivation to the students. It also tightens the bond between **the student** and **the Principal**.
- **Equal opportunities** are given to the entire department to address the assembly in order to develop the **art of public speaking**.

Other Programmes:

- **Entrepreneurial Club** motivates the students to become an entrepreneur. It gives awareness on institutional support and incentives from Government. It stresses the thrust of entrepreneurship.
- **Department of History** has included “**History for Competitive Examinations**” as part of their curriculum. Various Departments offer employability oriented Certificate /Diploma/ Advanced Diploma programmes for the benefit of the students.

5.1.7 Does the College have an International Student Cell to cater to the needs of foreign students? If so, what measures have been taken to attract foreign students?

The college has no formal International Students Cell but the institution facilitates necessary provisions to cater to their needs.

5.1.8 What types of support services are available for?

Various Support Services are available for the students.

1. Support Services available for Overseas Students

The following support services are available for overseas students:

- Hostel facility is given.
- Special medical care is provided.
- Registration of Visa at the time of arrival.
- Visa extension, if required for academic purpose.
- No Objection Certificate is given at the time of leaving India after completion of the course.

2. Support Services available for Physically Challenged/differently-abled students

- They are duly considered with regard to **admission** and **classroom allotment**. Special infrastructure facilities like **ramp, separate seating arrangement** in the classrooms and library are provided.
- They are facilitated to **serve food** in their rooms by the mess in-charge, if required.
- Transport facilities are provided for the students in the college campus.
- High priority is given to them for the **institutional scholarships** and the other support services available from the college.
- The Physically disabled students are given preference in the library.
- The classroom lectures and study materials are provided to them in the form of **audio cassettes**.
- **Scribe** facilities are provided at the time of examination.
- The boarding and lodging facilities are made as per the requirement of the student; they are accommodated in the **ground floor**.
- **Mobility** is assisted inside the campus with the help of **peer group**.

- They are also motivated through the **success stories** of the **celebrated physically challenged people**.

3. Support Services available for SC /ST/OBC and Economically Weaker sections

- Meticulous efforts are taken by the institution to avail the Scholarships offered by the **State and Central Government** and also from various **Private Sectors** for the welfare of **SC/ ST** and **OBC** students
- Apart from this, the college also gives concession in fees and facilitates to **pay in installment** to the **economically weak students**.
- **Remedial coaching** to improve the academic performance and **special coaching classes** for **IAS, NET/ SET** and other **competitive examinations** are offered.
- **Free meal, clothing, study materials** and **term fees / bus fees / examination fees / mess fees** concessions are provided to the economically weaker sections.
- The students are encouraged to engage in various works inside the campus under “**Earn while you learn**” programme. The following tasks are undertaken by the students
 - During weekends, interested students work as **sales girls** in the canteen.
 - **Tailoring** students stitch **chudithars** as well as **blouses** especially for the boarding students.
 - Some students prepare **paper plates/shopper bags** for canteen uses.

Participation of Students in various competitions/conferences in India and abroad

- Students are encouraged to participate in various inter collegiate competitions and conferences/seminars
- Academic guidance and financial assistance are given to students to participate in various inter-collegiate, State / National level competitions and conferences.
- Proper training is given to the students to perform well in the competition and programmes.
- In the **general assembly**, the **certificates** and medals won by the students in competitions and conferences are given by **the President and Secretary/ Principal**. This **encourages** them and also **motivates** others to involve in such competitions.

- Travel allowance is given to the students to participate in various cultural and sports events at Intercollegiate, University and State Level.
- The students are **accompanied by the staff** whenever they go out of the campus.
- Arrangements for **refreshments** are also made during **practice sessions**.
- Information on such events is displayed on the departmental and common notice boards.
- Students participate regularly in the **Youth Festival** conducted by **Madurai Kamaraj Universtiy**, Madurai and bringing many laurels.

Health Club - Health Insurance etc.:

- Health club provides **medical care** for good health, in need.
- **Health Care Committee** is formed to give counseling related to primary health problems of the students.
- **First Aid Kit** is available in the Health Club Centre.
- A well-equipped health centre with a qualified staff nurse functions to treat the sick and administer **First Aid** for the students.
- In case of severe illness, the students are taken to the nearby hospitals (A.R. Hospital).
- **Free Medical** and **health check-up** for students are organized by **various cells** of the institution.
- Group Insurance Scheme for students is in force in collaboration with Oriental Insurance Company. For each student, Rs. 37/- (per year) is charged as premium for a coverage of insurance up to Rs. 50, 000 /-.

Skill Development Programmes:

- College organizes **Soft-Skill** training programme for students to develop their skills.
- As first year students require language support, through trainings like **Communicative English** and special **Aural-Oral** practice which is the part of Part II English curriculum, are offered. These classes are handled in **Digital Language Laboratory**.
- English language teachers use this software to evaluate the **students' language skills**.
- **Self training classes** are also provided to improvise their language and grammar skills.
- **Bridge course** is conducted regularly in the **beginning of every academic year** for the freshers by all the Departments to make them familiar with equivalent English terms in their concern major subjects, since majority of them have done their schoolings through Tamil Medium.
- Introduction to computer classes are conducted.
- The Department of English organizes presentations, **debate competition** and **book review sessions** to **enhance the Spoken English skills** among the students.
- Certificate course in “Spoken English” is offered by the department of English.
- Department of English offers a SBE and NME Course for UG students in English for communication with a **special thrust on Spoken English**.
- **Talking Club** and **Readers Club** are constituted in the college to promote communicative skills in English.
- A course in Computer is incorporated in a curriculum of each department to assure computer literacy for all the students.
- Special classes are conducted for the students those who are weak in English.
- Additional computer training is also offered.

Job Oriented Skills:

- Special lectures and guidance are provided to students for appearing **competitive exams**.
- **Job oriented papers** are incorporated in the curriculum by all the departments.
- **Certificate / Diploma / Advanced Diploma / PG Diploma courses** are conducted by the departments aiming at the development of employability skills.

- Entrepreneurial skills developed through Self Development programmes such as **Two wheeler Four wheeler driving, Tailoring, Beautician course**

Performance enhancement for slow learners / students who are at risk of dropouts:

- Tutor / Mentor identifies the slow learners and provide additional support to enhance their day-today study.
- They are encouraged, motivated, personally and academically. They are counseled in the mentoring session.
- In the **Parents Meet**, the academic progress of the **ward / slow learners** is discussed in the respective departments and remedial measures are taken.
- Special attention is paid to slow learners by conducting **remedial coaching** and a **series of tests** after the working hours and a separate register is maintained to assess and enhance their performance.
- Elaborate question bank with solved answers are provided to the students.
- **Class and Unit test** are conducted for the improvement of the slow learners to be sound in academics.
- **Extra lab sessions** are handled for the slow learners.
- The **attendance** of the students taken by the teaching staff is shown to the parents to prevent the **long absentees** from **dropping outs**.
- **Dropouts** are readmitted and facilitated with the required study material to complete their course.

Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/ corporate/business houses:

- According to the curriculum the students are exposed to **other institutions** for higher learning through **projects, In-plant training, visit to industries, instrumentation centres, research institutes, hands-on training, educational tours** and **campus drives**.
- Students are encouraged to participate in Conferences, Workshops and Educational visits to enhance their knowledge through interactions with students and teachers of other institutions.
- College organizes Internship training programmes to expose the students to **corporate and non corporate hospitals**.

- PG Students of **Physics department** have done their projects on ‘**Solar Energy**’ at Regional test centre (solar thermal), School of energy, Environmental and Natural resources, at Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. During their projects, students have collected data from various institutions (The Department of Nano-Technology, Karunya University, Coimbatore; Research centre at Thiyagaraja College, Lady Doak College, Madurai).
- To gain practical knowledge on **Dairy Processing, B.B.A** students visited Hatsun Agro Products, Madurai, Bharath Rubber Ltd. Vadipatti, Kaleeswara Mills, Kalayar Kovil, Ramco Cement Ltd, Chennai and The Hindu Paper Unit, Madurai.
- To gain practical knowledge on Dietetics, every year, the outgoing students of **Nutrition and Dietetics** undergo 15 days **Dietetic Internship programme** in any multi-speciality hospitals, Madurai as part of their curriculum during their fourth semester. As per the guidance from the course teacher and the Chief Dietitian, case study is analyzed and their project report is submitted.
- Ten Students from III year B.Sc., **Zoology** underwent Internship training in Laboratory of **Radiology and Imaging** Department at Vadamalayan Institute of Para Medical Sciences, Madurai.
- In the department of **Computer Science and Computer Applications (BCA)**, the final year students undertook their projects in the VI semester. The projects were done under the guidance and collaboration with **ESPE e-solutions** Private Limited, Chennai. The company staff members directly visited the college campus and helped the students to do their projects successfully.
- Final year students of the department of **Computer Application (MCA)** carried out their projects under the guidance of **Sofia Technologies, EL Technologies** and **Sysmind Soft**, Madurai. Students undertook their projects in the company atmosphere. This type of approach helps the students to learn the advanced concepts as well as real time implementation and situations.

Publication of Student Magazines:

Every year the college publishes **annual magazine**. Students contribute their **essays, articles, poems, stories, general knowledge** and **drawings** in the magazine. The institution

started a **college monthly News Letter** entitled “**CAMPUS TWEET**”, to know about the happenings in the college premises. It serves as a platform to exhibit and hone their creative potentials.

5.1.9 Does the College provide guidance / coaching classes for Civil Services, Defense Services, NET/SLET and any other competitive examinations? If yes, what is the outcome?

Yes.

- Regular classes are conducted through the UGC sponsored programmes like **Entry in Services, NET/SET** coaching for the PG students and coaching for **competitive examinations** for UG students. The students are motivated and made aware to appear for these examinations.
- Students access the well equipped library which helps them to prepare for the competitive examinations.
- Faculty members provide guidance and counseling for the students when they prepare for competitive examinations.
- Experts from various institutions are invited to motivate the students to appear for the competitive exams.
- Every year, all final year students attend **Personality Development Programme** for **twenty working days (40 hours)**.

i. General Knowledge Class:

Final year UG students (semester V) attend General Knowledge classes for two hours per week. The areas covered in general knowledge classes are **Economics, Commerce, History, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Computer Science, Sports, Current affairs, Numerical ability, Reasoning, Tamil, Sanskrit and English.**

ii. Manitha Neyam IAS Academy :

The **Manitha Neyam** IAS Academy offered coaching classes in the college campus since 2011 with the primary objective to provide “Effective Guidance” for candidates preparing for the **Civil Services Examination** conducted by the Union Public Service Commission as well as “**Group-I Services**” Examination conducted by the Tamil Nadu Public Service Commission for general studies and in their own area of optional subjects.

The classes are conducted **every Thursday** between **3.00 p.m and 4.00 p.m** in order to boost up the students for the above examinations. Study Materials and **1022 books** worth to the tune of Rs. **1,00,000** are housed open in the **Central Library** for the students community.

iii. CSIR-NET/JRF Coaching :

With a vision to facilitate, provide and equip the students to appear for NET Examinations, **UGC sponsored coaching classes** are organized in the college premises. It caters to the students exclusively to prepare, for the UGC NET/SET examination and assists them to get through it successfully. Since, these exams are mandatory for a teacher to be appointed in College/University. **Study materials** are provided with all relevant aspects pertaining to the course. The quality coaching imparted not only enables the students to clear the exam, but also to become more confident and motivated personalities.

The main objectives of the programmes are

- To equip the students to face the challenging world ahead.
- To train SC/ST/OBC candidates and minority communities.
- To inculcate knowledge relevant to the faculty to which they belong.

5.1.10 Mention the policies of the College for enhancing student participation in sports and extracurricular activities through strategies such as

*Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations

Policy:

Students' personality is enhanced through co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

- **Physical Education/NSS** is mandatory for I and II year students under CBCS curriculum.
- The students are motivated to take part in extra-curricular and sports activities at Inter-collegiate / University / State level. The winners are acknowledged and appreciated in the **general assembly** and in the **College Annual Day**.
- The sports and cultural committees supervise the over-all activities.
- Special coaching / teaching, practical sessions and examinations are conducted and On Duty is given for those who miss the regular classes.
- Whenever the sport students miss their regular examination, separate test is conducted for them.
- Flexibility is maintained in examination schedule to help them to complete their academic programme within the stipulated period.

*** Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials**

- A separate financial plan is allotted for special diet, during tournament practice session.
- Sports kits are provided to all the team members of various games.
- Players are given special preferences during the college admission and concession in term fees / examination fees / mess fees / bus fees are also taken into consideration.
- Free boarding is provided to the sports students.
- All players are given intensive coaching before the tournament.
- Financial assistance is provided for events held in other institutions.
- The winners are applauded in the general assembly.

5.1.11 Does the College have an institutionalized mechanism for placement of its students?

What services are provided to help students identify job opportunities, prepare themselves for interview, and develop entrepreneurship skills?

Career Guidance and Placement Cell comprising of a **Coordinator** and a group of faculty, renders placement and career counseling service to the final year students. Members of the cell render guidance and suggestions to the students through formal and informal meetings.

Services of Career Guidance and Placement Training are as follows:

- Creating awareness on career opportunities.

- To motivate students to opt for civil service examinations and other competitive examinations.
- To train the students through pre campus interviews in the following areas: **Group Discussion, Soft Skill training, Mock Interview, Logical Reasoning and General awareness.**
- To enable them to be good at **English Language, Computer Knowledge, Banking Awareness, Interview techniques, Resume writing and TANCET model entrance examination.**
- To organize **Campus drives** to recruit the students.
- To arrange a **one day trade show** (Sales Day) to develop their **entrepreneurship** skills.
- To train them in the **preparation of cottage industrial goods such as phenol, washing powder, face powder, candle making and ink.**
- To equip the students with employability skills.
- To help the students to identify the job opportunities through Certificate, Diploma, PG Diploma, SBE and NME Courses offered by various departments.

5.1.13 Does the College have a registered Alumni association? If yes, what are its activities and contributions to the development of the College?

Though not registered, the **Alumni Association** contributes actively to the welfare of the institution. The alumni meeting is organized during the **second week of September, every year**. Illustrious and prominent alumni are invited to deliver special lectures, to motivate the students, to pursue their higher education and to find the means of job opportunities. All the departments have alumni as members of their Board of Studies. Their valid suggestions are taken into consideration in framing and updating the curriculum.

Contribution of the Alumni:

- Alumni affairs have a link to the institutions main website for online interactions and transactions.
- Enhances the interaction between the current students and the Alumni.
- Organizes Alumni Reunions.
- The Alumni Voluntary Contributions are utilized for poor students.
- Endowment prizes are created by alumni.
- During the academic year 2012 – 2013, an ECO car was presented by the alumni association for the usage of the students.

5.1.14 Does the College have a student grievance redressal cell? Give details of the nature of grievances reported and how they were redressed.

- Following the directions of UGC, AICTE, and as per **Article XXV** of the constitution, **the Grievance Redressal Cell** is established in order to deal with the individual grievances of the students. It ensures the redressal of varied grievances.
- It is guided by the principles of natural justice.
- The Grievance Redressal Cell is an **easily and readily accessible forum** for prompt disposal of day-to-day grievances through impartial mechanism. It creates cordial relationships and harmonious atmosphere among the students, in the college campus.
- The student may easily approach the respective cell to submit their problem in writing. Further encouragement is given to express their grievances freely and frankly, without any fear of being victimized.
- Ward meetings are conducted to address their issues that need attention.
- Suggestion boxes are placed in the hostel and in other important locations. This box is opened on **every Friday** and grievances are redressed.
- The Grievance Redressal committee gives its best efforts to workout solutions for the issues as early as possible.

A record of the grievances and redressal measures are taken by the Co-ordinator of the Grievance Redressal Cell. Grievances mentioned above are redressed by the cell with due representation to the management. Apart from these, minor grievances are received and redressed periodically.

5.1.15 Does the College have a cell and mechanism to resolve issues of sexual harassment?

There is no room for such issues inside the campus, but minor problems related to the sexual harassment outside the college are handled by the mentors and staff counselors of the college.

The staff and students of the college attended one week workshop on “**Sexual Harassment against Women**” to create awareness among the students.

5.1.16 Is there an Anti-Ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, Anti-Ragging committee is functioning actively in the institution to eradicate the threat of ragging. The committee consists of the **Principal, all the Heads of the Departments, Students Service Officers, Hostel Warden and Physical Director**. In the beginning of every academic year anti-ragging committee meeting is conducted to create awareness among the students on the evils of ragging. The students are intimated through notice board about the organized committee of anti-ragging and the acting mechanism. The college has installed **suggestion/complaint boxes** in the college premises and at the **hostel** to drop **complaints of ragging**. To instill sisterhood values, all senior students, hostellers and day scholars, are asked to take pledge against Ragging. The periodical report on Anti-ragging measures is sent to Higher Education Department. Until now, **any case of ragging has not been encountered**.

5.1.17 How does the College elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co - curricular activities, research, community orientation, etc.?

The College elicits co-operation from all stakeholders through the following activities.

- **At the time of admission**, the student and their parents have **to meet the Principal individually**.
- **An Orientation programme** is organized for the freshers on the opening day of the college.
- The **vital stakeholder** is the parent. **Parents Teachers meeting** is conducted twice annually. At these meetings suggestions about academic programmes are received. These meetings play a key role in revision, supplementation and enrichment of the curriculum, teaching learning, evaluation, students' support and infrastructure etc.
- The fruitful suggestions of the parents in the PTA Meet contribute to the development of the students.
- **Through SMS**, absentees and holidays are informed to their parents, daily.
- Any **irregularity** and **indiscipline** observed is informed to the parents over phone and their co-operation is sought in solving the issues.
- The presence of the **parents is insisted** upon in any **disciplinary proceedings against their ward**.
- Parents are invited to **Sports Day, Annual Day, Convocation** and other prime functions of the college.
- The institution receives **feedback from students, parents, faculty members, supporting staff, industrialists, alumni, external academic experts and members of local community**. It makes improvements in teaching and learning system to ensure the overall development.
- **Management** committee meets periodically **to review the progress** of the planned college activities.
- **Staff meeting** is conducted periodically **to review the past activities** of the college and to receive the suggestions from the staff members and to execute the programmes.

- A few **retired staff** and philanthropists have contributed funds for **Endowment Prizes** and Scholarships (for economically needy students).
- Students make an appraisal of teacher support on a **3-point scale with 7 criteria (questionnaire)**. Scores are averaged to a 3-point scale and teachers are given a feedback on all the 7 expectations of students from any teacher.
- Feedback is obtained from the students on courses offered, courses desired and on modifications in curriculum.
- Students' feedbacks are also used as a yardstick for the assessment of the performance of faculty.
- **Board of Studies** includes an **alumnus** to offer suggestion on syllabi revision. Most of the alumni, who participate in academic decision-making, **hold high positions** in industries.
- By being members and **conveners of several organizing committees**, students carry suggestions to decision-making bodies, regarding academic and administrative needs.
- **Motivation** and guidance are given by **eminent industrialists** and **researchers**, regarding research aptitude to the students.
- Well-wishers of the college are the members of **Governing Body, Academic Council** and other **non-statutory bodies**.
- **Coaching** is rendered by **professional coaches**, to the players.
- The **public** also extend their co-operation in the organization of NSS special camps and activities of NSS in the adopted villages.
- In NSS Camps, Social welfare programmes, leadership training and awareness programmes are taught through competitions.
- Free General **Medical Check-up, Veterinary Camps** and **Awareness Programmes** are organized by the **College Union**, NSS and YRC volunteers, assisted by Government Medical Officers (Rajaji Hospital), Lions Club, NGOs and Welfare Trust.
- **The Regional Joint Director of Collegiate Education**, Madurai region, assesses the functioning of the college by attending Governing Body Meeting and Academic Council Meeting, Audit Review Meeting and surprise visits and guides the institution in all aspects.

Thus all the stakeholders ensure the development of the college.

5.1.18 What special schemes/mechanisms are in place to motivate the students for participation in extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural events, etc?

The college provides optimum opportunities to motivate the students in the participation of **intra and inter collegiate** sports and cultural events.

Activities conducted within the college:

- **Players** are given preference in admission and **free education with boarding** and other amenities including **uniforms**.
- All first year students have to select either **NSS** or **Physical Education** which is included in the curriculum of **Part V**.
- **Physical Directress** and **Coordinators** of various committees provide the students with opportunities for participating in various activities at intra-collegiate and inter-collegiate levels.
- The college has arranged **Yoga classes, Karate** and **Taekwondo** for hostel students.
- Participation of students in **Annual Sports Day** enhances their sporting spirit.
- Every year, the College conducts **Intramural competitions** in sports for **Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, Basket Ball, Kabbadi, Ball Badminton, Badminton, Table Tennis** and **Athletics. Overall Rolling Shield, Overall Athletic Cup and Individual Championship** is given during the **Annual Sports Day**.
- Friendly matches between students of various Departments and **Department-wise March-Past** competitions are also conducted.
- **Merit certificates** and prizes are presented to the winners and runners in College **Annual Sports Day** celebrations.
- The **winners of Sports and Games** are applauded in the **General Assembly** and their photos are displayed on the general notice board. The photos of **University Blues** are published in the **College Annual Magazine**.
- **Fine Arts** committee provides a gamut of opportunities and encouragement for the development of creative, aesthetic and artistic talents of the students through various cultural activities in “**Youth Talentia**”.
- Fine Arts Committee, that fosters cultural heritage through creative activities, organizes “**Youth Talentia**”, the **Dance Club**, the **College Band**, the **College Union** and the

affiliated associations, impart training in developing skills in fine arts and **cultural activities** and prepare them for collegiate / inter-collegiate competitions.

- **Religious festivals** like **Ganesh Chaturthi, Navarathri, Saraswathi Pooja, Vijayadasami, Pongal** and **New Year** are celebrated.
- In collaboration with **Ramakrishna Math, Madurai** and **Vivekananda Kendra**, the college conducts ‘**Bharatha Panpattu Thervu**’ on Bhagawat Gita and Swami **Vivekananda’s Principles** which motivate the students to know their heritage and culture.

Activities conducted outside the college:

- All the Departments encourage the students to participate in inter-collegiate competition and cultural events.
- The students are encouraged to present/participate in State, National and International Seminars, Conferences and Workshops in various institutions.
- Students participate in **Games** and Athletics at **Inter-collegiate / District / State / National level** with zeal and enthusiasm.
- Students eagerly participate in the **Annual Youth Festival** organized by Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai and in other inter-collegiate competitions.
- NSS volunteers perform cultural programmes in the adopted villages and create awareness on various social problems and issues.

The institution collects feedback from all the outgoing students of the UG and PG annually. **Teaching and Learning Cell, Curriculum Cell, Student Support and Progression Cell** - meritoriously frame **questionnaire** on various aspects of the academic programmes such as teaching and learning resources, teaching and evaluation techniques, evaluation of teachers' performance, the rapport between the staff and the students, curricular aspects, physical facilities etc. The consolidated feedback of the students ensures the **escalating progress** of the college.

The requirements recommended by the students like **Health centre, Lunch shed, Vehicle parking shed, Rest room, Photocopying section, Bank** (Inside the college campus), **Internet facilities, Transport facilities** and **RO Plant** for **Drinking** water are fulfilled by the management over the years.

- **Yes.** Feedback is obtained once a year, during the **Alumni Meeting** and **Convocation Ceremony**. The alumni give suggestions and also share their experiences for the growth and development of the college.
- During the on-campus and off-campus interviews, **the employers** give suggestions and required skills to the students.
- During the **Board of Studies Meeting** and **Academic Council Meeting**, the experts from the industries give suggestions and necessary changes are carried out in the curriculum.

- **Students magazine committee** encourages the students to contribute articles, stories, poems, write-ups, puzzles, drawings, verses, and essays, which are published in the college annual magazine.

- “**CAMPUS TWEET**”, a news letter, by the student, for the students and of the students, highlights the present trends in education and also emphasizes the moral conduct of the students.
- Students are encouraged to express their views, ambitions and talents through “**campus tweet**”.
- Students exhibit their creative writings in their respective department notice boards, which encourage the students’ interest in wall publication. These materials are preserved by the concerned departments.
- Students are encouraged to present research papers in the state / national level conferences which are published in the proceedings.
- Students are involved in various conferences, technical fests, workshops, guest lecturers to inculcate innovative ideas.

Science Expo:

Scientific Models, postures, photo collections, drawings on important and recent trends in their subjects with various themes prepared by the students are displayed in the ‘Science Expo’, conducted by the college **every year**.

5.3.6 Does the College have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its constitution, major activities and funding.

Students’ Council: The College has a Students’ Council. The students’ council is a statutory body constituted in the college.

Selection: Students who is volunteer in shouldering responsibilities are identified and nominated for the selection of college union. Based on the performance of the students, in the presence of the Principal, the Director, Administrative Officer, the Dean of Academic affairs, Controller of Examination, Student Service Officer and heads of the department are analyzed with respective attributes of leadership quality, service mind with good communication skill are selected.

The **College Union** is the main organization of the student body. The **Principal** is the **Ex-officio President** of the **union**. A faculty from each department is appointed by the Principal as **Student Service Officer**. Student’s presidents, Vice Presidents and Secretary for both

Regular and **Self Finance stream** are selected. Apart from the class representatives, an office bearer is selected by the Students Service Officer. The tenure for office bearers is **one academic year**. The Students' Council includes a President, a Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Office Bearers, Bus co-ordinators and Heads of various committees.

The College Union arranges meetings, cultural programmes, competitions and debates. It enhances the students' personality by promoting the leadership qualities among them. The Principal and faculty members guide the students' council for the smooth functioning in various events and activities. Meetings of the Student representatives are conducted periodically to receive feedback based on teaching-learning, hostel etc.

The College Union includes activities such as conducting **General Assembly**, announcing information regarding the dates of competitions and meetings. They also include Student Welfare Schemes and celebrate functions such as Freshers' Welcome, **Independence Day, Teachers Day, Republic Day, Sports Day, Graduation Day, International Women's Day, Annual Day, Farewell, Union Valediction and Candle Lighting Ceremony**. The Guest lecturers arranged by the affiliated Associations and Committees / Clubs are funded by the UGC Autonomous Grants.

Role of the Office Bearers

The office bearers (strength 64) mediate the requests, ideas and complaints from students to the Students' Council. It is their prime duty to maintain punctuality and discipline in the college.

Fine Arts Secretary:

Cultural events, competitions and various other events are monitored by Fine arts secretaries, who are assisted by SSO faculties.

Activities: The following activities are conducted with the help of Students' Council and office bearers.

- Celebrating National important days to **instill patriotism**.
- The office bearers function as volunteers, in intercollegiate competitions, conferences, workshops, career fairs and during prize distribution ceremonies organized by the college.

- Celebrating Teachers Day, Saraswathi Pooja, Vinayagar Chathurthi, Pongal and New Year.
- Organizing Inter-collegiate competitions.
- Conducting various Association programmes.
- Organizing sports events.

- The institution has formed various **Academic Committees**/Association works with the faculty members and the student representative.
- Later, the committee members choose a group of students to act as representative for steering the activities conducted under the banner of the Committees/Associations.

(i) Leadership in Organization's Management System Development:

The success of an organization / institution depends on the participatory Management from all quarters. The leadership role is developed by assigning responsibilities to all the members of the Management, faculty members and students. Participatory management can improve the effectiveness and capacity of the college through assigning responsibilities to faculty members and students that help realize their true capabilities thus making the college march towards excellence.

Involvement of Management:

The Management committee meets twice a year. The members of the committee plan the agenda and matters like fee pattern, annual budget, proposals on infrastructure, funding agencies, appointments, expenditure incurred, examination results and audited statement of accounts are discussed and detailed. Suggestions taken on recommendations from the previous meeting are reported at the subsequent meeting.

A thorough discussion ensues and final resolutions are taken for implementation. This approach promotes the development of a more directive participative management style based on both Management leadership and employee involvement.

Involvement of Governing Body:

Governing Body comprising of 1800 members meet annually to discuss the academic affairs of the college. The annual budget of the preceding academic year is presented in the Governing Body together with the proposed developmental plans for the succeeding year.

Involvement of other committees:

The Principal frames committees /club / cell/ association such as Grievance committee, Student Service Organization, National Service Scheme, Extra curricular committee, Student

Union, Parent Teacher Meet Association, Alumni Association, Staff club, Library Committee, Finance Committee, Sports committee, Anti-Ragging committee, Red Ribbon Club, Eco Club, Women's Cell, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Research and Development Cell, & Youth Red Cross and a minimum of two faculty is entrusted with the responsibility of convenorship of committees. Thus college promotes leadership roles and managerial skills.

Involvement in IQAC:

IQAC - Internal Quality Assurance Cell that meets periodically checks the curricular and co-curricular programmes of the college for the enhancement and sustenance of quality education.

Hierarchical structure for effective leadership:

- Institutional Management to facilitate the growth of the institution.
- Principal, the head of the academic institution, to facilitate continuous improvement.
- Dean of Academic Affairs and Controller of Examinations, to design, deploy, review and evaluate the curriculum.
- Academic Council and Board of Studies, to analyse and approve the curriculum.
- Heads of the departments to plan academic / administrative activities for the succeeding academic year.
- Every faculty member is a member/convenor in a minimum of one committee.

(ii) Implementation and Continuous Improvement:

Departmental annual plan:-

At the beginning of every academic year all departments prepare annual plan and submit it to the Principal for suggestions before implementation.

Financial Allotment:-

Decisions regarding the financial allotment for the purchase of equipment, books, faculty training, workshops / seminars for every department is done by the Principal.

Faculty Enrichment Programme:-

- To maintain the quality and sustenance in education Faculty Enrichment programmes are periodically organized by inviting experts from other institutions.

- Student coordinators (Office-bearers) take care of the co-curricular / physical education activities.
- Peer Team student tutors to monitor the slow learners in manageable groups (4-7).
- All departments organize weekly Prayer every Friday.

Thus, both teachers and students develop leadership qualities and at the same time they perform their duties in an effective way.

(iii) Interaction with Stakeholders:

The College enjoys a healthy rapport with its stakeholders namely - Students, Parents, Alumni, and Industry.

Students:

At the beginning of every academic year, college organizes a special orientation programme to the freshers. Principal and faculty members interact with students and make them feel as a part of the institution.

The annual alumni meet held during every September brings alumni to the campus. The alumni contact is possible through face book, website and phone contacts. Alumni promote the image of the institution in the organizations where they work.

Parents:

Parents Teachers Meetings are organized every year and any grievance from a parent is listened to and appropriate measures are provided. The Principal interacts with the parents on issues pertaining to academic and residential life.

Teaching and Non-teaching Staff:

Programmes like staff meeting, retirement parties and invited lunch on special occasions creates a sense of belonging for the staff members. The college administration takes every possible step to meet the grievances pertaining to personal or professional needs.

Industry:

College takes much care in inviting industrialists for their active involvement in the programmes and activities of the college. A strong link between the college and industries / other

institutions includes the MoUs regarding curricular design, campus placement drives, membership in Board of Studies and Invitations to the Academic Council.

Society:

Extension and Consultancy activities promotes excellent interaction with the society. Any important achievement made by the institution is made known to the public through college website, newspapers and organizing a press meet.

- Student welfare committee obtains feedback and make suggestions to improve the thrust areas like curriculum, governance, teaching and evaluation for quality sustenance.

Participatory form of management is one of the most effective strategies to retain the best talent in the institution. All the members of the college collectively shoulder the responsibility. It is the level of approach at the grass root level that determines the functioning of the college. As such the college encourages a culture of participative management. The whole process is well coordinated and controlled by the sincere and honest efforts of the **President & Secretary and the Principal** under whose administration the functions are well planned.

In order to ensure transparency in organization decision making the office of the **Director, Administrative Officer, Dean of Academic Affairs, Controller of Examinations, IQAC coordinator and Office superintendent** act accordingly to the decisions of the management committee. Participative management operates at three levels – Management committee, Principal and Faculty members. The management committee conveys the decisions to the principal and the principal constitutes different committees involving faculty members for the effective implementation of the decisions taken. This approach promotes the development of a more directive participative management style based on both management leadership and employee involvement. Under the collective consultations of the management with the Principal and the Faculty, decision making process is implemented. Teachers play an important role to

discuss and debate all issues related to curriculum design and different components of evaluation process.

The **Student's union** consists of students from aided and self financed stream to represent the whole student community. The President and the Secretary of the student union responsibly suggest, discuss and disseminate the decision to the entire student body. The students also participate in the **Board of Studies Meeting and the Academic Council Meeting**.

Academic Leadership:

- The Vice-Chancellor of Madurai Kamaraj University appoints the **University Nominees of the Governing body** (Autonomous), **Board of studies** for various disciplines, **Academic council** and **Awards Committee** for developing and strengthening the curriculum by their constructive suggestions.
- The **Principal** and a **Senior Faculty** attend the **Academic Council** of the Madurai Kamaraj University regularly.
- The college is an autonomous institution and the University provides degrees / diploma certificates.
- The results of the semester Examinations (Autonomous) are placed for approval by the Awards Committee meeting.
- The University deputes one member for the **Building Committee, Finance Committee** and **Planning & Evaluation Committee of the college**.

Administrative Leadership:

- **New courses** when introduced get inspected by the subject experts and University nominees.
- Any new appointment in the college takes place in the presence of the **University Nominees** and **Subject Experts**.
- A **University Nominee** is a member of the **Management Committee** of the college.

- The Dean, College Development Council (CDC) of the University forwards the budget proposals to the UGC for financial assistance.
- The Principal is the selected member of **Academic Council** and **Senate** of Madurai Kamaraj University.

6.1.8 How does the College groom the leadership at various levels?

The college encourages and motivates faculty participation in all training programmes organized by **National** and **International organizations**. In order to strengthen the leadership roles, the college constitutes various committees consisting of **senior, middle and junior level of faculty members**, where experienced and innovative ideas are gained through brain storming sessions/ discussions. The college identifies faculty members with excellence at the middle level and grooms for leadership roles by entrusting with the responsibility of convenorship of committees. Except for the major officers, college does not choose heads of the departments as conveners of committees, thus involving and grooming the junior faculty members for leadership and enhancement process of the Institution. This kind of arrangement in the organizing and working committees is suitable for the growth and harmony of the Institution.

Training Pogramme:

The Principal, faculty members and coordinators of various committees are encouraged to attend leadership training programmes to strengthen the leadership roles

Principal:

The Principal attends the workshops and conferences on higher education and convenes all meetings held at the college.

Teaching and Non-Teaching staff:

In addition to Teaching staff, the non-teaching staff are also given due importance and made members of a few committees by entrusting them with the responsibility of an office.

Students:

The college organizes special programmes like **Personality Development** to groom the leadership quality of the students. Students prove their mettle by participating in the **Annual Youth Festivals** organized by Madurai Kamaraj University. All the activities are looked after by

the leaders of **Students Union** for example **General Assembly, Karate, Yoga and Band Music**. Thus the college insists on utmost care for leadership qualities among students

- Students take an active participation in Seminars, Workshops, Sports and Conferences conducted by other institutions
- Students organize Tours, Field Trips, Extension Activities and competitions inside the college

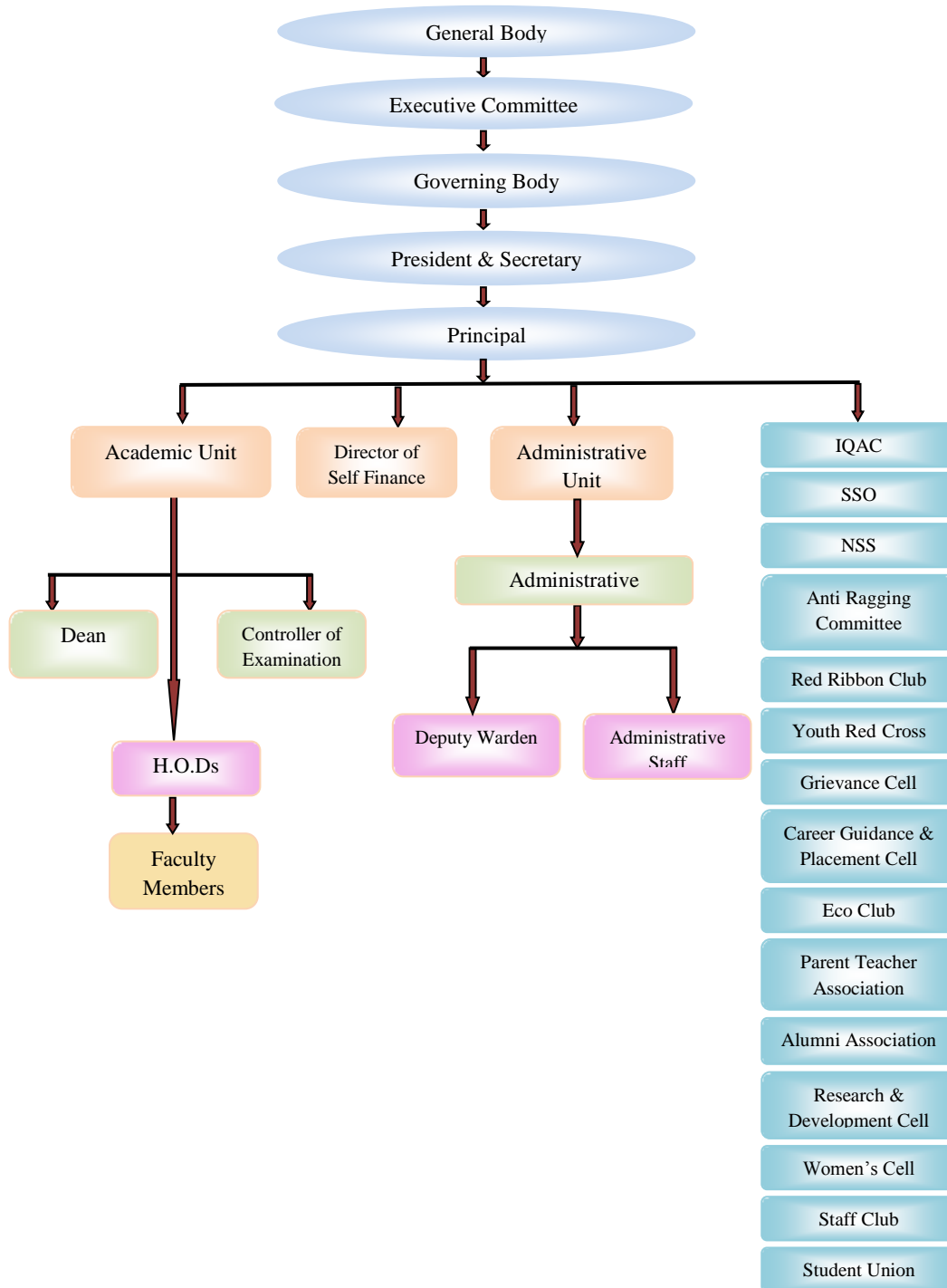

The Management committee plays a pivotal role in decision making and implementing them effectively. The **Governing Body** and other administrative committees at the highest level gives enlightened leadership to the officers of the college, namely the **Principal, Dean of Academic affairs** and **Controller of Examinations**.

The **Management Governing Body** meets once in every three months. Two different subcommittees constituted by the management Governing Body i.e. **Governing council** and **Executive council** meet prior to the board meeting, discuss all matters and present their recommendations to the **Management Governing Body**. Actions taken on recommendations from the previous meeting are reported in the subsequent meeting.

The **General Body** meeting comprising a strength of **1800** members discusses proposals on infrastructure facilities, property matters, funds received and expenditure incurred in the preceding academic year. The audited statement of accounts and balance sheet is presented in the Annual General Meeting.

The **Autonomous Governing body** is the apex of the Academic body which has representation from the **UGC, State Government, Affiliating University** and **Industry** includes the officials of the college. The members of the Autonomous Governing Body meets once in a year. It discusses matters like Budget proposal, new plans for development, allocation of funds for infrastructure improvement, new appointments and grants received form funding agencies. The Principal present the report for approval and it is reviewed by the members of the committee where valuable suggestions are recommended for the growth of the college.

The **Principal** along with the **Faculty Heads** and individual faculty members discusses **academic and non-academic** responsibilities, **future plans** of the departments, new proposals and final resolutions which are taken for implementation. This shows the **decentralized administrative** and academic autonomy that helps comfortable functioning of the college.

Redressal of Staff Grievances:

The **Staff Club** of the college is very instrumental in bringing out a healthy rapport among the faculties. The staff club organizes the **General Staff Meeting** twice a semester one in the beginning and another at the end. 2 senior faculty members one each from aided and unaided stream are designated as **Secretary and Treasurer** of the club. Other than the general staff meeting the secretary and treasurer also organizes meeting whenever there arises a need. Faculty members bring their grievances to the **Principal** through the heads of the departments in the **staff club** meeting or privately. Apart from academic activities, teachers also share their personal needs. The Principal is always accessible to the faculty to share their grievances. The non-teaching staff members express their complaints to the Principal through the office superintendent of the college. All the complaints are resolved quickly.

Parent Teacher Association (PTA) Meet organized every semester records the grievances of parents. Parents emphasized the need for **bus transport** from Melur (25km) and for **effective English communication skills** (Spoken English)

Mechanism to analyse:

- Complaints received are discussed at different levels in the staff meeting and quick remedial action is taken.
- **Student Service Organization** looks after the welfare of the students.
- Complaints received through feedback are placed for proper discussion and early resolution.
- Grievance suggestion boxes are kept in the campus and once in a month suggestions are noted and necessary actions are taken.
- Students feel free to discuss their Grievances to their Office bearers, Student Chairman, Tutor, Course Teacher and Department Heads.

6.2.6 Does the College have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

The IQAC obtains feedback related to **Curriculum, Teaching**, Co- Curricular and Extracurricular activities, Examination and Evaluation System, Infrastructure facilities , Library services, Quality of students service and office administration regularly from **Students, Parents** and **Alumni**. The analysed data obtained from the feedback is presented before the staff meeting and necessary changes are put in action. This practice implemented in the institution has resulted in changes and betterment in the curricular aspects, infrastructure facilities and Student Support Services.

Introduction of relevant employment oriented courses and modification of some existing courses are the outcome executed from the feedback. Students present the feedback on field trips, seminars and guest lectures and this helps the departments to make necessary changes when they organize next time. Feedback collected are kept confidential and this mechanism monitors the effective implementation of various activities of the departments.

6.2.7 In what way the affiliating University helped the College to identify the developmental needs of the College?

The college being an autonomous institution is affiliated to the Madurai Kamaraj University. The university authorities support all innovative efforts taken by the college. The Representatives from the university are members of the Board of studies, Academic council and Governing body of the college, where they offer constructive suggestions for all the developmental plans of the college.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university have a functional College Development Council (CDC) or Board of College and University Development (BCUD)? If yes, In what way College is benefitted.

The University has a college Development Cell (CDC), which has the right

6.2.9 How does the College get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how it is utilized?

Feedback from Teaching Staff:

Feedback on curriculum, examination and evaluation, courses offered, library and infrastructure facilities, are collected department wise. In response to this feedback, teachers are given the freedom to revise and modify the syllabus

Feedback from Fresh graduates/Alumni:

Alumni Feedback is collected annually from our alumni during Convocation Day and **Alumni Association** meeting. This feedback analysis gives details on the number of students who have gone for higher studies, employment details and competitive exams passed by the alumni. All departments have separate Alumni visitors' notebook.

Feedback from Parents:

Parents-Teachers Meeting are conducted regularly by all departments. Opinions/Remarks/Suggestions are listened to by the concerned authority of the respective department and necessary action is taken.

6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

The Heads of the Departments and Faculty members are given autonomy to

- Freedom to frame new courses
- Prepare their own curriculum and update as per the need
- Purchase list-Equipments/Books/Journals
- Freedom to constitute the panel of External members for the Board of Studies and the Academic council
- Freedom to invite academic experts for their National/State level Programmes

- Freedom to register PhD in any university of their choice.
- Freedom to devise their own methods & principles of teaching in the Teaching –Learning process
- Freedom to evaluate(SBE/NME) answer scripts.
- Freedom to plan and execute activities
- The Dean of Academic affairs and the Controller of Examinations monitors the academic programme for its high standard
- Course teacher has the right to make up to **20% modifications** with proper reasons in the summative question paper set by the external examiners.

6.2.11 Does the College conduct performance auditing of its various departments?

Yes, The College conducts performance auditing of its various departments.

The college enjoys a collective leadership of a dynamic administrative team which includes-Industrialists, Engineer, Businessmen and Educationalists to make a review of the facilities available in the departments, Examination results, teachers' profile and infrastructure available. Annual Planner consisting of execution of plans, programmes to be conducted, completion of syllabus for the next year is prepared and analyzed. The secretary, Principal, Dean of Academic affairs, Controller of Examination and all Heads of the Departments reviewed the suggestions and recommendations given by the members and appropriate measures are taken immediately. In addition to the analysis, Self-appraisal of all faculty members are submitted by each member to the IQAC. Self-appraisal form provides information regarding all aspects of individual performance. This kind of practice holds good for the purpose of promotion and for improving teachers quality.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the College to enhance the professional development of teaching and non teaching staff?

Professional Development of the staff is achieved by updating the knowledge and skills by

- Granting permission to attend Refresher courses and orientation programmes in the UGC recognized Academic staff college
- Orienting the new recruits every June insisting on the core values and ethos of the college.
- INFLIBNET training to the faculty by the librarian.
- Realizing the need for continuous improvement, workshops on E-content preparation, curriculum enrichment, examination pattern, Academic Audit and soft skills Enhancement were organized for all the faculty members
- Faculty development programme is being organized on communication and fluency skill in English for newly recruited faculty.
- Permitting the teachers to attend Refresher Courses and Orientation Programmes in UGC recognized Academic Staff College.
- Every year Orientation programme is organised for the newly recruited faculty to equip them about CBCS syllabus pattern, credit points allotted, examination pattern.
- Twenty one days ICT enabled - computer training programme was organized for the newly appointed teachers.
- Guest lectures on professional ethics, e-content development, Innovative curriculum and Modern teaching methods, e-learning, Research, Tips for preparation of Research projects , Present scenario of research in India were arranged for the benefit of faculty. Quality enhancement and of higher studies and Google Applications for education were organized for all staff members.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions.

- ❖ Health care centre has been constructed with beds.
- ❖ RO plant has been installed in the hostel and college campus for providing drinking water to the staff and students.
- ❖ Thermal power cooking is adopted in the Hostel.
- ❖ Two new bore wells have been erected to augment water supply.
- ❖ Smart class rooms with the interactive white board and with modern teaching electronic gadgets.
- ❖ Two diesel generators have been installed.
- ❖ LCD projector and Copier machine have been installed for presentation and photocopying of study materials.
- ❖ To cater the needs of students, staff and office, Karur Vaisya bank is functioning within the college premises with ATM facility.
- ❖ Day care centre has been established for the benefit of working women.

6.3.3 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Besides salary package, the management has offered several incentive measures for the welfare of its employees. A list of incentives is given below:-

- Maintenance of Crèche –for kids below 3 years of age of Teaching, Non-Teaching staff , Students and the public.
- Every year 2 sets of uniform is given to Class IV workers at the college expense.
- Leave on loss of pay (LLP) is offered for faculty to pursue research for a period of 6 months.
- All the aided staff members are covered under health insurance scheme provided by the Government.
- Financial Assistance by way of salary advance upto Rs.3000/- cash is given in a year to the management staff which is deducted from the salary in 10 equal installments without any interest.

- Fee waiver for children of employees admitted at E.M.G.Yadava women's college.
- Incentive of Rs.1000/- for Ph.D., degree holders.
- Aided and Unaided faculty (Non-Teaching Staff) are taken on a tour every year at the college expense.
- Preference for the children of the CLR (Casual Laborers) in admission to school run by the management.
- A love for nature is expressed through sale of vermicompost by the staff and students of Zoology department at subsidized rate in the campus to the college community.
- All management staff are covered under ESIC scheme provided by the Government.
- Free meals token issued to class IV cadre to dine in the hostel.
- Management disburses money to its employees at times of emergencies.
- Under EPF scheme college contributes a sum of money equal to individual contribution.
- Bus facilities for staff members at minimum cost.
- Conveyance allowance for attending State/ National/International seminars.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the College for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The Management always acts fair and reasonable to both aided and self-financed faculty during times of sharing the administrative responsibilities and representation in committees. Periodic revision of pay is done for the management faculty. The management has decided for an annual increase in the Dearness Allowance by 15 % for the management staff. Special pay hike for the Ph.D., and the experienced staff at the time of joining is given to the Management staff.

6.3.5 Has the College conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

All the faculty members in the **institution** are **women**. Hence the question of **gender audit** is not applicable. In the clerical and Class IV cadre of management and Government employees, number of women outnumber men two to one. Among the Government employees, men in clerical and Class IV cadre are 32 % while 68 % are women.

6.3.6 Does the College conduct any gender sensitization programs for its staff?

The women's cell which was constituted in the year 2003 has been very instrumental in conducting gender sensitization programmes. Guest Lectures and Seminars are periodically organized to sensitize the student community.

6.3.7 What is the impact of the University's UGC-Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing competencies of the College faculty?

Newly recruited staff members, participate in Orientation programmes conducted by Academic Staff College for a duration of 30 days. This 30 day programme aids the teachers to improve their teaching ability by imparting knowledge, selecting methods, planning and executing their lesson-plan and adopting methods that suit the learners. Orientation programmes create an opportunity to interact with peers, seniors and subject experts from other institutions. Refresher courses enable teachers to update their knowledge in their respective disciplines.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

The Management committee along with Finance committee monitors the effective and efficient use of financial resources. The budget proposals are prepared taking into considerations of the general and departmental requirements. The sum of contribution is determined by the management committee in the consultation with the secretary of the college. Every department is given an allotment based on the need of the department.

6.4.2 Does the College have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

External Audit:

- Annual audit by Regional Joint Directorate of College Education, Madurai region.

The college collects and maintains money from students and kept as corpus fund in the college account. This sum of money is invested as fixed deposit and the interest generated is spent towards the maintenance of infrastructure.

6.5 INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM

6.5.1 Does the College conduct an academic audit of its departments? If yes, give details.

Yes, the college conducts academic audit of the Syllabus, Question Bank and blue print of Question papers of all the disciplines. Academic Audit concerning Contents, Coverage and Evaluation Pattern is done by Subject Experts. The Summative Examination Question Papers are audited by the Subject Experts at the time of evaluation in the COE office.

The External Experts validate syllabus unit wise and give their opinion with regard to the coverage of the content and the subject, the coherence between one unit and the another unit and whether skill oriented, knowledge oriented and recent concepts are included in the syllabus. The availability of the textual material and the reference books are also viewed by the external experts. On the day of the summative examinations all the course teacher audit summative examination question papers and report to COE.

6.5.2 Based on the recommendations of academic audit what specific measures have been taken by the College to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

The suggestion given by the external experts are communicated to each department for follow-up action. The department places revised syllabus in Board of studies after taking into account the suggestion of the external experts. The suggestion of the course teacher is taken into account for evaluation.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the College to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

Yes, the internal quality Assurance Cell of the college consistently reviews the teaching learning process. The structure of the IQAC is as follows.

The IQAC stimulates the academic, Support and Service forums to enhance and sustain a learner centric teaching ambience in the institution. In this regard the IQAC –Teaching , learning cell, organizes conferences, conduct orientation programs, Training programme, Faculty on innovative teaching learning methodology and effective evaluation strategies in higher education. The IQAC synthesizes the inference of the collected data, executes and implements the current trends- e-learning, Virtual resources, smart classrooms, online results publication, recording students Internal marks via **Intranet Facilities** in teaching learning and evaluation.

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

The main task of IQAC which is planning, monitoring and implementing the academic and administrative functions of the college meets annually and submits **AQAR report** to NAAC.

In order to have quality sustenance, IQAC offers valuable suggestions and measures for continuous improvement.

- Transparency in the academic and administration procedures.
- Framing the syllabus according to the societal needs.
- Motivating the faculty to pursue research and permitting them to register in any university of their choice.
- Fair distribution of responsibilities among faculty.
- Documenting the various quality enriching programmes/activities of the college.
- Collecting the feedback responses from stakeholders.
- Comments and suggestions are documented and passed on to the respective bodies – Dean Office, Examination cell, the department and various cells for further considerations.

6.5.5 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

The Active functioning of IQAC in the college since 2004 includes external members, from different fields. IQAC constitutes members from the field of Education, Industry, Alumni, Students and Stakeholders apart from 11 members of different faculties. Their comments on suggestions facilitate continuous improvement in the whole academic process.

- Introduction of New Programmes.
- Introduction of New Certificate Courses.
- Disseminating the information on various quality parameters of higher education.

6.5.6 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

- ❖ Most of the students are first generation learners whose medium of instruction was Tamil in school; when they come to college they study their undergraduate programme in English and find it hard to cope with a foreign language.
- ❖ Communicative English, Reading club, English Enrichment classes, Bridge courses, “**A word of a Day**” and remedial classes are some of the programmes constituted for the incremental academic growth of slow learners.

- ❖ For the betterment of the student community the counseling cell jointly with **TOP KIDS**, Madurai regularly organizes counseling sessions to the needy.
- ❖ Career Guidance and Placement Cell conducts programmes to help the students face the Entrance Examinations of MBA, MCA and TANCET and competitive examinations like Bank examinations, TNPSC, RRB, TRB and UPSC.
- ❖ Students when complete their degree are capable of starting their own business by undergoing Self Development Courses like Beautician Course, Two-wheeler and Four-wheeler Training, Tailoring, Clay Ornaments, Fabric/Glass Painting and Jewellery making.

6.5.7 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centers, etc.?

(i) Administration

- The College reviews the administrative and academic departments periodically to ensure quality related measures to the functioning of the institution.
- Principal conducts **Staff Club** meeting as scheduled in the annual calendar, to review the academic activities.
- Assigning duties with respect to administrative and academic functions.
- Maintenance of department registers, recording the stock equipment and checking the library books at the end of every academic year.
- Allocation of funds for the improvement of infrastructure and research activities.

(ii) Academic Departments

Review of academic departments is carried out periodically. The Staff Club meeting provides a comprehensive review on availability of infrastructure, performance of students and academic policy. Course teachers make a review for the courses they teach at the end of every academic year through the feedback from students.

(iii) Subject Area

The subject contents, course contents, delivery and evaluation practices of the courses are reviewed by the course teachers from time to time.

(iv) The Department

The Heads of the departments periodically conduct Department meetings to review the daily activities, completion of syllabus, annual plans to be carried out for the next year. The need and obstacles faced by course teachers in the evaluation and delivery of courses are analysed and suitable modifications are formulated. The Controller of Examination reviews the summative evaluation of all courses. In response to the review suitable modifications are emphasized in the forth coming semesters. The Library Advisory Committee (LAC) reviews the requirements and complaints on library resources once a year and suggests appropriate measures. The Information and Communication Technology (ICT) coordinator analyses complaints related to hardware & software and necessary measures are undertaken.

(v) Research Centers

The Post graduate departments stress the need for high quality publications of research articles and the impact on stakeholders. International, National Conferences, Workshops and Seminars are conducted periodically for the welfare of the faculty. In the Central Library, International and National Journals, Books and e-Resources are available. Resource persons of high eminence from various universities are invited to the departments to share their knowledge on research.

(vi) Additional information

Having crossed 40 years in the field of education, EMG has been striving towards excellence since its inception. For any organization to function effectively collective leadership & good governance is essential. The success of EMG is because of the collective governance which is very effective. Participatory management, increased transparency, decision making, value education and cordial relationship with the stakeholders act as a strong force behind good governance.

Criterion – VII INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

Environment consciousness is enshrined in the mission of the college and tree plantation is the major concern of the institution to maintain the pristine purity and beauty of the college to provide a congenial atmosphere for the academic and non-academic pursuits. Felling of one tree for the construction of building to meet the growing academic requirements is replaced by planting a few trees in the campus.

Our college is situated in the outskirts, having free and easy access to city with a well-laid highway road and frequent transport facilities. From the entrance, there is a well-laid tar road connecting all the blocks in the campus. The front-view garden, beautiful blossoms, green fencing plants, lawn, building surrounded by shady trees, with the statue of Lord Krishna contribute to the pleasant and serene ambience of the college.

All students dining at a time, three times a day reduces the usage of power consumption and paves way for energy conservation. As per the UGC's recommendation, 'Environmental studies' is included in the curriculum for the third year students. Common study hours in ground/halls, building without lift facilities are the solid evidences to prove the efforts taken to conserve energy.

7.1.1 Does the College Conduct a Green Audit of its Campus?

Green audit of the campus is carried out by the staff periodically by supervising the maintenance of the existing trees and locating places for planting new trees. Personal experience of sowing seeds, watering plants, preparing and using organic manure, removing weeds etc., have ecologically been sensitized by the NSS Volunteers. They regularly conduct programs to establish eco friendly atmosphere in the campus and hostel areas. The government itself advises to avoid plastic materials to become eco conscious Hence thrust is given on plastic free zone in the campus. The NSS volunteers are extensively involved in campaigning against the plastic materials, collecting plastics and handing over to self help group to lay plastic road.

The institution encourages eco-friendly activities and creates awareness on environment by organizing events such as:

(i) The department of Zoology organized a two day **National Conference on “Water Sanitation and Hygiene”** WaSH-2015(UGC-Autonomous Grant) on 20th & 21st February 2015. The conference was organized with the objective to focus the real problem in water sanitation, hygiene status in India, to specify the problems in rural and urban sanitation, to highlight the nature of disaster and sanitation and disability and to provide suitable technologies to overcome the problems .

(ii) An International conference on **“Eco and Sustainable Tourism”** was sponsored by UGC and was organized by the Department of History on 11th and 12th March 2013. More than 115 research scholars participated from all over India and different disciplines presented their papers in the conference. They also conducted UGC sponsored National Conference on **“Eco Tourism”** on 12th August 2013. These conferences encouraged Eco-friendly activities and created awareness on environment.

(iii) On October 19.10.2012, **Eco Club** was inaugurated in our college with the aim to sensitize the students on environmental issues. **“GO GREEN DAY”** was celebrated at our college where the staff and the students attired in green color to commemorate the day. Eco Club helps to extend the boundaries and scope of the formal educational system, encouraging creativity and empowering students for constructive action.

In **collaboration with Lady Doak College**, Eco related activities have been initiated with the corpus fund of Rs.50, 000 granted by the **United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia (UBCHEA)**, which includes **signages of trees** and Eco- tour.

(i)The speciality of our campus is it is a store house of rare plants and trees. These trees are given their respective botanical names.

(ii) **Eco-tour** was arranged on behalf of the Eco club to the nearby villages Mallaiyoor and Palamedu. The staff and students were taken on a trip to the villages and they were made aware of the farm practices, cuisine of the villages and the socio economic problems prevailing

there. This Eco tour to these villages was highlighted in a renowned Tamil women's fortnightly 'Aval vikadan' on March 2013, as a praise worthy act.

“**Clean India**” (Swatch Bharat) campaign was organized at the adopted village. NSS volunteers participated in the rally marching from Vemparali and created awareness on cleanliness and hygiene among the public. The volunteers cleaned a part of Parali Pudur Village.

7.1.2 What are the Initiatives Taken by the College to Make the Campus Eco-friendly?

- **Energy Conservation**

Electric power consumption in our campus has been reduced to a greater extent due to the regular planned and regulated activities such as pooled **study hours, common dining, timely physical and sports activities. Modernization and mechanization** of the mess with modern kitchen equipments have reduced the use of traditional methods of cooking leads to conserve energy.

Meetings on the open stage in pleasant weather, ward meetings under the trees and strict adherence to college norm of turning off the electricity during day time in hostel reduce the energy consumption. Thermal stove is used in our hostel for making food which converts water into steam to drive turbines to generate electricity. Hence electricity is saved greatly.

In our hostel solar boiler has been used for cooking rice and idly. It not only helps to cook huge amount of rice and idly at minimum time and it also contains tremendous electric energy. Solar cells generate electricity using sunlight. By this method our college conserves the electric energy and serves our society (Nation).

- **Use of renewable energy**

The college hostel is provided with **solar boilers** to reduce the use of fossil fuels, which is the main cause of carbon increase in the atmosphere.

- **Water harvesting**

Percolation ponds and **rain water harvesting** structures have been installed in the hostel campus to minimize water shortage and maximize available water usage. These structures are situated near the bore wells in the campus; so that the water table is recharged. Rain water harvesting structure installed, prevents soil erosion and meets the water requirements. The waste water and sewage generated in the mess are used for growing trees. The spent water of the reverse osmosis plant is used for gardening and other purposes.

- **Check dam construction** - Nil
- **Efforts for carbon neutrality**

The root cause for increase in atmospheric carbon content is due to the wide usage of transport system. Efforts for carbon neutrality have been taken to reduce carbon emission to keep the campus, pollution-free and uncontaminated. The college buses and the ladies special buses from Tamil Nadu State Transport Corporation commute students and staff to the college so that the usage of individual vehicles is reduced. The college bus and other vehicles are checked periodically by the RTO and are provided with (CNG) pollution free stickers. Students are motivated to commute to college either by **college bus / public transport** or cycle.

Use of **disposable plastic tumblers** in the canteen and departments is strongly discouraged and use of paper plates and paper cups are encouraged. To create our ambience a “**Plastic Free Zone Campus**”, National Service Scheme Volunteers collect plastics in and around the college campus. Plastics collected by the students are handed over to ‘**Swadeshi**’, the Self Help Group, functioning at Naganakulam, Madurai, to lay down **Plastic Roads**. Students are encouraged to cut down the plastic usage in the days to come. It is to be noted that plastic bags have been **completely banned** in our college campus. The withered leaves and the waste papers are not burnt. Our college strives not to search for carbon neutrality procedures but reduction of carbon is being tried.

- **Plantation**

Saplings planted in and around the buildings enrich our campus. **Green house** is established to make the students realise and to be aware of the concept of **global warming** and it also **refreshes** the **eyes** and the **mind**. On the occasion of 84th Birth Anniversary of India’s former people’s president **Dr.A.B.J.Abdul Kalam**, **84 saplings** were planted as a mark of respect to him. The sapling includes special varieties such as **red sandal wood** (Terrocarpus red sandilinis) **Neem** and **Pungamia**. The plantation was inaugurated by the President & Secretary of our college and the District Forest Officer, Madurai.

During NSS camps, saplings plantation is made as an essential part of the programme. Saplings are planted in the villages in protective environment and the village people look after the growth of trees. Periodically, NSS volunteers visit the respective villages where the camp was conducted.

- **Hazardous waste management**

There are no hazardous chemicals used in the laboratory.

- **E-waste management**

Old computers, its accessories and UPS batteries are sold to the local vendors on buy back basis. The waste compact discs are used by students for decorating and participating in competition such as ‘Art from Waste’.

The **General Assembly** is conducted on **every Friday** for one hour in the morning. It is arranged for the students, in order to communicate information and share learning experiences.

Objectives of the practice

- Inculcating values and virtues in the mind of students
- Familiarising with day to day events
- Enhancing General Knowledge
- Creating a bond among the students, and between the staff and students and vice-versa
- Kindling the creativity in the students and bringing out the originality and hidden talents.
- Developing the leadership quality

The context

An assembly is where the students meet together to share aspects of life that are of worth. It acts as medium for communicating matters of significance from one generation to another. Assembly acts as a one of the main ways by which we create our positive reflective ethos and promote our values-based education. All faculties and students make a tremendous contribution through their presence and active participation. Students are aware that all staff by their positive attitude involve themselves in assemblies, acting as role models for the students to emulate. Assembly contains times of quiet reflection that enables students to develop the deepest values and aspirations of the human spirit. The students enable to learn the values, life skills and understand the structured environment. Assembly can serve to develop a positive college ethos that confirms the college identity and aspirations. The result being that the college lives in cohesive harmony that sustains the pursuit of excellence in all its forms.

The Practice

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

During rainy season, it is difficult for the students to come from different buildings to attend the general assembly in the ground.

Best Practice II - YOGA

Yoga is a vast collection of spiritual techniques and practices aimed at integrating mind, body and spirit to achieve a state of enlightenment or oneness with the universe. To make physically and mentally stronger, the hostel students practice yogasanas in the morning and evening at our campus. Yoga helps to equip oneself with basic knowledge about one's personality and to handle life situations. It enable them to learn techniques related to good health. It develops a discriminative mind capable of knowing the real from the unreal and helps to face the dualities of life with equanimity. It inculcates great values in the minds of the students.

Objectives of the practice

- To improve the concentration power
- Synchronization of mind and body
- To improve the emotional intelligence

The Context

“A sound mind is a sound body” says an old adage. The mind and the body should be taken care of, as they act on each other. Physical health is essential to happiness. If the body is strong and healthy, mind will also be healthy. Students will be cheerful and will be able to work with confidence. Therefore, the body and the mind are interdependent and complimentary with each other. Stress removal is one of the salient feature of yoga. If mind is free from worries and concentration is made upon one single entity, naturally the level of stress will be reduced and they will be removed gradually. Yoga helps in self-discipline and self-control, leading to immense amount of awareness, concentration and higher level of consciousness.

The present day situation warrants yoga programme in the academic field and also in the society. The college conducts yoga classes to the hostel students by a trained yoga master. Classes on yoga is offered to the students at free of cost.

The Practice

Yoga is practiced by our college hostel students regularly. I & II year students perform yoga from **7 am to 8 am** and from **4.30 pm to 5.30 pm** respectively. Students are selected to take, in- depth training on advanced yoga to perform in the sports day. **World Yoga Day** was celebrated on **26th June 2014**.

Students practice various yogasanas such as Ustrasana, Suriya Namaskaram, Padmasana, Padahastasana, Purpauddhanasana, Dhanurasana, Bhujangasana, Shalabhasana, Halasana and Gomukhasana and so on. Hence it helps to increase the efficient functioning of kidney, to balance the panic and mental forces and very useful to reduce weight.

Evidence of success

Every year Students perform yoga on the occasion of the **Independence Day** and **Republic Day** celebrations in the A.R ground. Our students are presented with “**Best Yoga Performer Award**” and received overall shield from the **District Collector**. It is evident that some of the best **trained yoga students** serve as **yoga masters** in schools and educational institutions.

For the Past ten years our college has been conducting Yoga classes for hostel students. To commemorate **International Yoga Day**, NSS Units conduct Yoga training on 21st June 2015 where more than 400 NSS volunteers are trained in continuation of International Yoga Day celebration; our college NSS units conducted yoga training for the school students of the adopted village in Parali Pudur.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- During rainy seasons, it is difficult for the students to come from the hostel to attend the Yoga classes in the ground.
- Some students experience initial difficulty in performing yoga.
